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Preface

It gives me an immense pleasure to present the self-study report (SSR) of Dr. C.V. Raman University, Kargi Road, Kota, Bilaspur (C.G.) to the national assessment and accreditation council (NAAC), Bangalore for assessment and accreditation. We have made our sincere efforts and taken due care to present the facts as per NAAC guidelines while preparing this SSR.

Dr. C.V. Raman, the first noble laureate of India in science observed that the real growth of a country is in the hearts, minds, bodies and souls of the young men & women of the country. His sentiments were echoed in the words of Dr. A.P.J. Abdul Kalam, the Ex-Scientist-President of India, who said that Education should form the central focus of development and nation building. So, these words of C.V.Raman & Dr. A.P.J. Abdul Kalam inspire to the prime objective of Dr. C.V.Raman University. Dr. C.V. Raman University has been setup on 3rd November 2006 and inaugurated on 14th October 2007, with the above objectives in view. It has been setup in a tribal scheduled area of Chhattisgarh with a view to take up education, research, training and extension activities in this under – developed region of the state.

At present the university runs 8 faculties with 26 departments in which 54 UG, PG, & Diploma programmes are being conducted. Recently UGC and MHRD allotted Pt. Deendayal Upadhyay Kaushal Kendra to CVRU for running B.Voc. & M.Voc. programmes, as the university had already been working with NSDC through CVRU-NSDC Academy by running skill oriented programmes to fulfil the Mission of skill-India. Besides this the university provides research programmes (M.Phil/Ph.D.) in different department of the university.

The university has set up a community radio station named, “Radio Raman” on 90.4 MHz frequency FM under its institute of open and distance education (IODE), with an objective to broadcast necessary educational and entertainment based content focusing on the basic rights of the local community in terms of education, health and law. The university is also contributing to the fulfilment of overall development of students and goal of the state of Chhattisgarh, i.e. University provides higher education facilities in tribal area, approximately 60% students of this university belongs SC/ST/OBC and rural area.

I am extremely happy to present and submit the self-study report (SSR) of Dr. C.V. Raman University Kargi Road, Kota, Bilaspur, Chhattisgarh to the NAAC, Bangalore. I hope that the NAAC will accept this SSR and will arrange to send the peer team to visit our university.

Executive summary

Emerging as an educational hub in Chhattisgarh & located in the backward tribal region of Kota, Bilaspur, Dr. C.V. Established on 3rd of November 2006, CVRU has not spared any effort in transforming itself into a global educational hub, which has carved a niche for its own. CVRU aspires to be a cutting edge university by anticipating the needs of future and meet them by creating an environment that supports, teaching, learning, skill and research towards excellence. Through an innovative research based pedagogy along with world class facilities and opportunities, the university is inspiring students and providing a platform to “BE MORE” (University Slogan). The university vowed to meet various challenges such as quality, quantity, access, funding, autonomy, knowledge, skill, employability, infrastructure, research academia and development etc. by upgrading its programs and faculty to strengthen the academic structure and environment of the university. Through a unique pedagogy and dynamic faculties, CVRU is aspiring the young professionals to grow into an intellectual, responsible and trustworthy citizens of tomorrow who can create a difference and make a difference in their respective fields. A continuous interface between the university and industry has created a strong network with the corporate world. The student-centric activities like projects, internship and placement results have been one of the key achievement for the university. Also, CVRU always encourages its students to actively participate in all types of extra-curricular activities and All India Youth Festivals etc. As, the University is a place of learning as well as moulding the future Universe, hence the university must plan for the multidimensional and universal development of all its stakeholders such as students, faculty members, other employees etc. The all-round development of a student is practically possible only when he is exposed to the experiences and other numerous factors associated with life like Technology, Psychology, human philosophy etc. The faculty members of the university deserve appreciation for their diligence and dedication in strengthening the university through their significant contribution in several academic seminars, conferences, symposia etc. and publication of a number of research articles in journals of repute. The foundation of this university finds its inspiration in the ideas and thoughts of the first Indian Scientist to win a Nobel Prize, Dr. C.V. Raman. His words define what the university's policy is all about, i.e. enabling each student to go beyond boundaries and set new benchmarks. Thus the University helps students to expand their horizons by going beyond the tried and tested, defining strengths and weaknesses and developing new perceptions. These are the things what the university tries to inculcate in each and every student in the campus. Higher education contributes towards the generation and dissemination of knowledge and the creation of a cognitive and effective domain that is not constrained socio-economically or even by the forces of the nature. Knowledge is the engine that gears all progress and developments and this knowledge has got to be tempered with love and values. Thus, the university has experienced a quantum jump in the student enrolment with a huge number.

Therefore, this report (SSR) provides a deep insight into the university's educational activities, effective administration, state of art facilities and initiatives

that the university has undertaken in its journey of 9 years. A brief and executive summary of SSR is furnish below:

Dr. C.V. Raman University owes the responsibility to explore the new domains of knowledge and seeks the new insights in creating significant competitive environment. The institutional vision of this university reflect upon various initiatives to provide literal, legal, managerial and scientific knowledge to the students generating high morals, ethics and values with cultural heritage in them by helping the society in nation-building through nurturing and strengthening the young talents for being the trust worthy citizens of tomorrow. The CVRU mission is also envisaged to provide quality teaching and learning thereby improving their approach and skills towards the higher studies. This helps the university to obtain the wisdom of promising mission and vision. The university has a well-organized system of curriculum design and development. The university follows a systematic process in the design and development of the curriculum through the procedure consisting of various groups such as the academic council, the board of studies, the board of exam, all faculty deans, all professors, associate and assistant professors and members of the allied disciplines both at UG level and PG level where two issues are considered by the BOS i.e. the assessment need and the feedback need which is based on the current demand analysis, public opinion, expert views, industry requirements, state policies, technological aspects, UGC guidelines and other perspectives with respect to the feedback obtained from the faculty, students, academic experts etc. and the curriculum is discussed in the periodic meetings. CVRU maintains innovation and research as its core strength in its curricular aspects for developing the curriculum structure, through equitable proportion of practical training for gaining better employability. The University curriculum includes various programmes and courses of UG, PG, Diploma, PG-Diploma, Certificate Courses, enrichment courses, value added courses, skill oriented programmes and research programmes.

The teaching-learning and evaluation of the university undergoes an ordered methodology in a systematic way for an easy implementation. The university at the initial step advertises the admission notification to its various programmes and courses through the print media etc. and through its updation in its website. The university widely publishes its admission brochure and prospectus containing important information and guidelines regarding the admission process along with the application form enclosed in a schematic format. The entire mechanism of the admission process is taken care by the admission cell after the smooth scrutinization of the admission application forms in the further processing. The admission process involving the entrance examinations in certain programmes are monitored separately which adopt several criteria such as GATE, PET, AIEEE, PPT, MAT, CAT, NET, SLET, Pre B.Ed. entrance test and M.Phil. and Ph.D. Entrance examinations etc. for the various professional and higher level UG & PG Programmes like M.Tech., B.E., Polytechnic, MBA, B.Ed. & the research programmes. The complete process of advertisement of the admission notification and admission procedure start during the onset of the new academic session. The university admits its students according to their demand ratio in the UG, PG and research level on the basis of the categories like SC/ST/OBC etc. During the post-admission session, CVRU organizes several formal and informal induction programmes and gender – specific meeting during the beginning of session for the newly admitted

students to enable them to acclimatize with the conditions. The university follows an academic calendar to make the departments for smooth implementation of the teaching-learning Examination & evaluation plan. All the departments prepare the teaching plan and assessment accordingly. As, maintaining the standards of teaching and learning is the utmost responsibility of the faculty members, therefore they involve the ICT based advanced technology, e-learning and interactive methodology using projects in their teaching learning process. The university provides a structured course-outlines and course-schedules along with the required syllabi to the students prior to the commencement of the students to have an exposure to the realistic domains. This is made possible by the university by providing hands on training in instrumentation, computing and search tools to the students to enhance their innovative and interactive and interactive grip. Thus, the way of project based learning and practical experimental learning is promoted. Frequent use of smart classrooms and NPTEL Audio Video lectures takes place to maximize the students' potential of utilizing the ability, academic excellence, confidence and skill.

Research is the significant aspect and an integral part of the academic activity and academic excellence of the university. The university has an active R & D cell and a research committee for the promotion of research and to monitor all the research related issues and activities. It acts as an apex body to initiate the university's Research oriented responsibilities. CVRU runs its two programmes of research viz. M.Phil. and Ph.D. in the various disciplines of study for which it conducts its own university entrance tests separately. The university completely supports and encourages its research scholars and fulfils their research oriented needs towards the required investigations. CVRU provides the benefit of the research reward schemes as an incentive towards the welfare of its faculties and research scholars with respect to their significant work publication in the reputed journals. The university promotes and encourages interdisciplinary research and also facilitates researchers of eminence to visit the campus as adjunct professors. The CVRU earmarks its maximum percentage of its budget plan towards research and allocates a sufficient and a major amount for different research purposes such as field work, research lab instruments etc. The university has a centre of excellence for research i.e. CVRU Central Instrumentation Laboratory (CCIL) with the excellent facilities for the research scholars. The university actively participates in Shodhganga for depositing all its thesis and also helps the research scholars for easy e-resource access through INFLIBNET and DELNET facilities in the library. The university has an effective participation in the consultancy services, various extension activities and owes the Institutional Social responsibility in a definite manner by sensitizing its faculty members towards the society. CVRU has MOU with TCS, Microsoft, BSNL etc. for availing better consultancy services and has also tied up with the Rishi Aurobindo Society, Pondicherry. Some of the extension activities and ISR arranged by CVRU includes: The Ravindra Sangoshthi, The Vanmaali Katha Samaroh etc.

The university has excellent infrastructural facilities including adequate classrooms, high-tech seminar halls, digitalized e-classrooms with interactive boards of teaching, well equipped advanced laboratories with sophisticated advanced instrumental facilities, computer labs with excellent internet connectivity with many software installed, full Wi-Fi campus full-fledged central library and well

managed departmental libraries. The infrastructure facilities and learning resources at CVRU are the key factors for creating the ambience in the campus academically to enhance the productivity of both staff and students. Thus, CVRU has been constantly up-grading its infrastructure. All the infrastructural facilities for the students of CVRU such as hostels, in-campus bank facilities, mess, canteen, laboratories, smart classrooms, sports facilities, playgrounds, courts, gymnasium, moot court in law department, GD-rooms, e-library, reading rooms, conference and seminar hall transport facilities, library with e-journals, books etc. are well furnished and developed at CVRU for its students.

To facilitate the students in a number of ways, the university organizes and promotes all types of academic activities, games, sports, extracurricular and cultural activities for their gradual and regular support and mentoring. CVRU also promotes language skill, communication skill and personality development programmes for its students. For the awareness of Job opportunities, the University training and placement cell with the TPO provides pre-placement training for the students and arranges special GD sessions prior to the campus arrival of the companies. Enough placement opportunity is given to the students of CVRU through various companies of national and international repute. CVRU is also having an Alumni association for the students to ensure effective interface with the alumni body worldwide. The CVRU students grievance and redressal cell gives proper hearing to the grievance regarding all issues formally and informally to provide the quick redressal. The university fulfils its vision and mission with an efficient involvement of its leadership through the regular meeting and interaction with its stakeholders in ensuring the management system developing implementation and continuous improvement and reinforcing a culture of excellence. It identifies the organizational needs and strives to fulfil them always. CVRU contributes to the National development by its huge enrolment of students resulting in an increase in the GER of the state and thereby of the nation gradually. CVRU also fosters the global competencies among its students and helps to inculcate sound value system in them. CVRU thereby develops the quest for excellence among its students with a vast dissemination of knowledge and quality education. CVRU promotes eco-friendly campus initiatives, conducts green campus strategy and arranges for its various innovations programmes and best practices for the social benefit.

- ✓ **Surrounding environment:** The whole campus of CVRU in a serene environment is surrounded by a huge and green forest area with a significant range of Bio-Diversity consisting of the verities of flora and fauna located on the Bilaspur-Amarkantak Highway.
- ✓ **Infrastructure:** Excellent infrastructure with a huge and spacious Green campus creating an ambience of state of art learning and teaching.
- ✓ **Faculty:** Excellent, Dedicated, skilled and competent faculty members with leadership qualities.
- ✓ **Students:** Sincere, disciplined, mannered, cultured, enthusiastic, respectful proactive and 59% of our students came from ST/SC/OBC category.
- ✓ **Administration:** Supportive, cooperative, caring and centralized administration with decentralized responsibilities.

Weaknesses:

- Due to the long distance from the city of Bilaspur, the students in the University campus suffer with inadequate and frequent transport facility and somewhat loss in their time management with slight scarcity of time.
- Being situated in the rural tribal belt of the state of CG, most of the University students and new comers are from the same rural back ground and with poor economical and financial status. Thus, despite of quality teaching, learning and training, many students are not able to easily qualify their competitive tests and are unable to pay their fee properly and completely in time within the due date.
- Though the university is moving towards automation, but the students residing in the rural area are not able to take the full advantage at their residence due to frequent electric failure and cut-off.

Opportunities:

- ❖ The location of the university provides enough opportunities for initiating curricula regarding tourism (Because of Amarkantak Road), anthropology etc.
- ❖ Being surrounded by the dense forests and a number of villages with rural disadvantages, the university provides a significant opportunity for diversified research in the field of biotechnology flora and fauna through biodiversity and towards the rural India and also being in the unexplored tribal belt with connectivity of Achankmar, nice scope is there for some novel research output for the students.

Challenges:

- ✚ The major challenge for the university is the development, progress and upliftment of the students and learners of rural and tribal areas, as the population is of low income group who are unable to support and afford the financial structure of higher courses and also are unaware of the further higher education programmes.
- ✚ As the university has a huge enrolment of students from different areas, thus, the university faces a major challenge for the quantity v/s quality and infrastructure which can cater to the needs of providing education of high global standards.

The university has its own health centre and dispensary comprising of two full time medical superintendents, i.e., one chief medical officer Dr. Avijit Royzada (M.D.) and one medical supervisor to cater to the needs of the medical services. The CVRU health centre and the dispensary of the university within its premises offers full time medical facilities for the students, faculties, non-teaching staff, administrative staff and other employees of the university. The dispensary provides service in the hostels also extends its emergency services too throughout the campus. All the students, staff, faculty and other employees of the university are provided medicines at free of cost. One medical officer and one assistant medical officer along with a medical compounder are appointed to take care of CVRU health centre and helps to avail the medical facility for each and every one in the university premises. The health centre of the university consists of the complete first aid facility, primary medical treatment facility as well as some of the diagnostic equipment and sufficient pharmaceutical medical store.

Besides this, we are also having an MOU with the Sai Baba Nursing Home, at Ring Road, Bilaspur in which for the special cases emergency and serious treatment, the students of our university are recommended and referred for the further treatment free of cost to the nursing home.

1. Radio Raman “90.4”(CVRU Community Radio)

Ministry of Information & broadcasting has granted permission to CVRU to establish community Radio Station. This University is the first in the State where students could be taught, educated, and youth will progress towards employment and a common man will wake up towards his rights, duties and liabilities through radio programmes prepared and broadcasted by CVRU. After its establishment in University “Radio Raman” has started on 90.4 MHZ from the year 2012 and commences its regular broadcast in a short while. It can be received by the community in 15.5 km radius around CVRU campus. In the real sense, community radio plays a pivotal role in making the masses aware about their basic rights and duties. Not only limited to solving problems which a common man faces in his day-to-day life, community radio provides a strong platform from where one can freely disseminate his ideas among his community members in the best possible manner. Thus, community radio becomes one of the important instrument in strengthening our Right to Freedom of Speech and well as entertaining local people, community radio also acts as an intermediary between the Government and the local masses. This is the place from where local people can air their grievances to the Government as well as get the solutions to their problems too. Needless to say, community radio has played a major role in bridging the Communication gap between the Government and the local people. As, the community radio is still evolving it might be possible that in the near future, we will witness its various new forms which will be technologically more superior as well as user friendly. Well whatever the case may be, community radio has proved to be one of the best Medium of communication at the grass-root level. This means that community radio stations should focus on getting the community talking and not solely on radio (which is a technological process); the social concerns of community radio are stressed over radio per se. There is also a distinction drawn in contrast to mainstream stations, which are view as change to catering commercial concerns or the personalities of presenters.

2. Deendayal Upadhyay Kaushal Kendra: MHRD Government of India’s scheme in University.

We are proud to say that we are the only University of Chhattisgarh which has been given **Deendayal Upadhyay Kaushal Kendra** by UGC and MHRD. The UGC has been allotted us M.Voc. and B.Voc. programmes in Telecommunication, Retail Management & IT and Manufacturing & also gave us research programme in vocation (NSQF Level 10) offering B.Voc. from session 2015-16. CVRU is the only university who offers NSQF level 1 to NSQF level 10 programme.

1.1 Curriculum Design and Development

1.1.1 How is the institutional vision and mission reflected in the academic programmes of the University?

Vision of the University

To be transformed into a University of global standards imparting world class education through skilled manpower which can make a significant contribution to the nation building and cater to the needs of the society by creating an intellectual domain that initiates, nourishes and perpetuates values of humanity conscious co-existence & achievement of excellence.

Mission of the University

Dr. C.V. Raman University is the University whose whole mission is to provide access and opportunity to students from all sectors of the country's diverse population as well as from other countries by providing quality education thereby improving the socio-economic status of the society. The Prime mission of CVRU is also to promote excellence in value based education and skill based teaching-learning.

Dr. C.V. Raman University (CVRU) is a premier university of the state of Chhattisgarh with its 26 departments inculcating education in the field of its various faculties of Arts, Science, Commerce, Management, Law, Journalism & Mass Communication, Engineering, Information Technology, Research, Education, Physical Education etc. through its numerous courses by an enrolment of huge number of students. The university was established in the tribal region of the rural environment of Chhattisgarh with its primary objective and vision of providing higher education to the students of rural background giving an access for them to obtain an easy opportunity for getting an advanced ICT based technological studies contributing to the higher education enhancement. Recognised by UGC and approved by AICTE, NCTE, BCI as well as certified by ISO: 9001:2008, being a member of AIU, the institutional vision of this University reflect upon various initiatives to provide literal, legal, managerial and scientific knowledge to the students generating high morals, ethics and values with cultural heritage in them by helping the society in nation building through nurturing and strengthening the young talents for being the trust-worthy citizens of tomorrow. As, the contribution extends towards the

positive attitude of these students of the university it is necessary to put forward the step of motivational standards as well as high inspiration and help sustain the society thereby eventually reshaping the world of today itself. This will definitely provide the platform and opportunity for the managerial, cultural, scientific & developmental growth among the youth for the programmes of knowledge and innovation with a successful and grand achievement. CVRU owes the responsibility to explore the new domains of knowledge and seeks the new insights in creating significant competitive environment. This helps the university to obtain the wisdom of promising mission and vision. The CVRU mission is also envisaged to provide online teaching learning facilities for its students through its learning centres, thereby improving their approach and skills towards higher studies. Keeping in view the vision, mission and objectives, the university offers many academic programmes. While designing the curriculum of the academic programmes, the respective board of studies takes into consideration the vision towards **national development, needs of the society, local needs, emerging needs and demands, expectations of stakeholders, innovativeness programme level standards, scope for further research, global demand, women empowerment, contemporary needs of the industry, inclusiveness** and so on. The academic programmes of the university such as courses in engineering, management commerce and technology are offered to help the industry and business background. The programs of social work, sociology, political science, law, philosophy, journalism and mass communication are offered towards the development of the society. The academic programs in all basic science are offered to promote scientific research in the community and the programs in languages are offered to develop the communication skills. Some collaborative programs, multi-disciplinary vocational courses, skill development programs (B.Voc./M.Voc.) as well as value added and enrichment courses of academic interests are also offered to meet the contemporary needs of the economy and the society. Thus, the university academic programmes are highly relevant to the need of the industry, economy and society. Also, many programs offered through distance learning provide access to higher education to all those who do not otherwise find an opportunity. In this regard CVRU for the students in the regular mode also provides NPTEL audio/video lectures to all branches of its engineering and diploma programmes. These lectures endeavour to instil self-employment skills in a large section of the students. The university has collaborated with IT Giant Microsoft for enhancing the course curricular activities. It provides office 365(A₂)SKU for all the faculties and students. The university has also setup a community Radio station named “RADIO RAMAN” at 90.4 FM under the

department of Journalism and Mass Communication with a specific objective to broadcast the necessary content of education oriented knowledge based entertainment focussing on the basic rights and needs of the local community in terms of education, health and law including the current keen demands to benefit the society. Through this community Radio, CVRU utilizes the technology in order to impart the educational content also to those students who are staying apart at far off locations. The radio station endeavours to give an extended foresighted vision & dimension to higher education system and orient the students towards community services. CVRU is also associated to the spoken tutorial project for its curriculum design and development, which is funded by National Mission on Education through ICT, MHRD, Govt. of India and project headed by IIT, Mumbai. It provides a series of tutorials and software such as Latex, SciLab, GNU/Linux, URCA and python etc. The University takes specific care to integrate the graduate attributes like communicative skills, leadership quality, value based education, scientific temperament, tolerance, team work, skilful knowledge, personality built-up, recreation, amusement, sporty spirit, peaceful coexistence, inductive and creative environment through curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. The ICT infrastructure at CVRU has enabled online access to e-books, encyclopaedia and many more online Journals.

CVRU has made itself to act upon its viable principles in its perspective of having dynamic education with significant harmony pertaining skill based knowledge in each and every disciplines of the University enabling its vision & mission to reflect in its academic programmes.

1.1.2 Does the University follow a systematic process in the design and development of the curriculum? If yes, give details of the process (need assessment, feedback, etc.).

The university has a well-organized system of curriculum design and development. Each department has its board of study at UG and PG levels consisting of the experts from the departmental faculty and also representatives from other University & industry. Basically two issues are considered by the board of studies i.e. assessment need and feedback need from all the members before designing and developing the curriculum.

The assessment need so done is based on the demand analysis, public opinion expert views, industry requirements, recent technological aspects, state policies, UGC guidelines and other future perspectives. The feedback need is obtained formally as well as informally from the

faculty, students, alumni, employers and academic experts periodically with systematic procedures. The drafted curriculum is discussed at length in the periodic meetings of the academic council for the academic senate for further approval, design and development of their curriculum. The academic council belonging to the academic senate consisting of the elite members to approve the new programmes, curriculum modifications, syllabus regulations etc. The University definitely follows a systematic process in the design and development of the curriculum. CVRU systematically designs and develops its curricula through a procedure consisting of the following groups:

- ❖ The Academic Council (AC)
- ❖ The Board Of Studies (BOS)
- ❖ The Board of Exams (BOE)
- ❖ All Faculty Deans
- ❖ All Professors, Associate Professors & Assistant Professors
- ❖ All Faculty Members & Co-Opted Members
- ❖ Members of the Allied Disciplines
- ❖ The Assessment Committee

Other CVRU Groups involved in the procedure are

- ❖ Board of Management (BOM)
- ❖ Governing Body (GB)

The University constituted the board of studies (BOS) and Academic Council (AC) for all the academic activities including design development and implementation of the Course curriculum, syllabus, modules etc. These bodies comprise of the departmental faculty, assigned members from allied disciplines of the University within the campus and co-opted members from the concerned discipline outside the University (off-campus) and then a formal discussion on Curricula is initiated. The BOS further forms the committees regarding this purpose for the proposal(s) which are then deliberated upon before finalization of the proposed curricula which is then recommended further to the Faculty and Deans for its considerations respectively. Thereafter, when the proposed curricula is once again deliberated upon, the Faculty is empowered to refer back the curricula for better up-gradation or improvement or modifications altogether for new curricula according to the current demand. The next step starts with a smooth processing of the protocol of designed syllabus & course content

approval, admissions, teaching, learning, examination, evaluation & assessment. All the curriculum design & development goes through the gradual discussion in all the meetings held in each stages such as the meeting at departmental level chaired by the Heads of the respective department, the meeting at Faculty level chaired by the Dean of each Faculty with its all HOD's, and the meeting at University level that is the meeting of Board of Studies & Academic Council chaired by the Vice Chancellor of the University.

1.1.3 How are the following aspects ensured through curriculum design and development?

Employability, Innovation and Research:

Being the seat of higher learning and the leader in quality with academic initiatives, the university has maintained innovation and research as its core strengths in designing and developing curriculum besides ensuring employability of the students. With respect to the design and development of the curriculum and also in updating the curriculum, innovativeness and future research are always the guiding themes in all the programmes offered by the university. CVRU has never accepted the static pattern of the curriculum and always promoted dynamism by way of its mode of adopting to the changes, modifications and initiating new programmes to meet the emerging needs of the society. For example, the University introduced professional programmes & twinning programmes as the following courses such as:

- Other vocational & Skill development courses.
- BE+(MTM)

These degree programmes are offered with an intention to expand the career opportunities of the students who complete more degrees in a much shorter time than the original required time to enhance and obtained better employability. In the curriculum design and development of various programmes, experiential learning, experimentations and projects are made by the university an integral part of the syllabus. The university offers 24 research programmes leading to Ph.D. degree and 19 research programmes leading to M.Phil. degree. The students/research scholars enrolled for the respective Ph.D. and M.Phil. programmes are required to complete the course work before they are allowed to take up the dissertation work. Each and every department of the University identifies the thrust areas of research and provides guidance to the students mostly in those thrust areas. In order to strengthen the research programmes, the university entertains the suggestions and interacts for necessary

communications from various research organizations of national as well as international repute, throughout the country and abroad.

As employability is also one of the priorities in the design and development of the curriculum, so to ensure that the programmes are suitable to the industry need or not, the university takes various measures such as continuous feedback from the students, alumni, employers, industry experts, recruiting agencies, parents etc. which are then collected to include in the design of new curriculum. Development of communication skills, personality development and up gradation of life skill are also given priority in curriculum design to ensure employability with ensuring value education (VE), Group discussion (GD) & personality development (PD) skills.

The university has been consistently paying special attention to:

- **Employability:** The curriculum design through an equitable proportion of practical training for skill acquisition and sound theoretical knowledge serves to equip the students to face real time situations and societal need for the curriculum which attempts to address the needs of various stakeholders such as industries, Govt. agencies, banking sector, farming corporates, major agro-based industries, insurance sector etc.
- All curriculum adopted by the university are beneficial for industries and other employers.
- Curriculum are modified and improved time to time according to demand and supply scenario.
- To increase and enhance language grip some new topics introduced in existing courses are communicative English, English language teaching, translation studies, biotechnology, Mass media etc.
- Introducing one skill oriented course from NSDC programme to each UG programme that is associated with regular UG degree programme to enhance employability. This will be beneficial to all students to provide their employment.
- Up gradation of learning tools such as laboratory equipment, introduction of ICT enabled programmes for moving from teaching to learning based methodology.
- The community radio station of frequency 90.4 MHz in

the department of Mass communication & Journalism has been established which play an important role in mass communication & journalism sector, thereby spreading awareness for job oriented courses with employability.

- Facilitating sufficient training and exposure to learn problem solving abilities, leadership abilities, team work ethics and other such skills.
- Introducing entirely new courses with high employability.
- **Innovation:** The University give a great deal of academic freedom enabling the introduction of new and innovative courses. The university with 26 departments of study under one roof provides the right ambience for introducing several innovative interdisciplinary programmes with innovative approach. Curricula are framed to inculcate the spirit of creativity and innovation at various levels. This is managed by including contents and items in syllabi and in teaching activities, evaluation and testing process, for example, writing projects, assignments, research papers, publications, attending and participating the National/International level conferences & seminars. Innovations are incorporated at various levels such as:
 - Selection of content for teaching & learning includes up gradation as per the global trends and job market, introducing inter-disciplinary contents.
 - Topics & items on syllabi are designed and redesigned accommodating the requirements of the multi-cultural heterogeneous classrooms.
- **Research:** Research is very important for every discipline in the university and a major engagement at CVRU. It is ensured in the curriculum design & development in the following ways:
 - Research capability of students is enhanced by introducing project work at PG level & by their visit at premier research institutes.
 - The research skills of students are enhanced through introduction of courses, activities and contents that include literature survey, data collection, data analysis

etc. & team work is promoted through group projects.

- Research orientation is enhanced by visit of students at premier research institutes.
- One research journal **“Bharat Journal of Science, Technology and Humanities”** (BJSTH) is being published by the university which provides a platform for publication of research papers of all staff & scholars of the university.

The university provides admission to Foreign Nationals/NRI Candidates in various courses on the explicit policy as defined in a separate Guide to Admission for them Stipulating the Terms and Conditions, eligibility requirement and selection procedure at the time of inviting applications.

The course of effective background significant future prospects for the students of foreign culture attracting their lifestyles & requirements according to their managerial needs have been already developed in the university curriculum among which in several courses the students already contact through international feedback perspectives. These professional courses such as BBA, B.Com. (CA), MBA, M.Phil. M.Tech. etc. entertain the international student's concentration in a massive way without any kind of impediments.

CVRU is at the forefront in designing courses with interdisciplinary approach. As the board of studies in the university includes the subject experts from the sister disciplines, this definitely facilitates the designing of curriculum on inter-disciplinary basis. But presently, the university promotes only two programmes in the inter-disciplinary field i.e. (Master of Technology management (BE+MTM), a student candidate completing his/her graduation/bachelor in engineering and technology can directly move on to the management field making himself/herself eligible for having Master's degree in the management discipline similarly the course of M.Sc. in Biotechnology where a graduate from the Botany/Zoology/Microbiology can move on for the programme of M.Sc. in Biotechnology being eligible in that respect. The university also promotes inter-disciplinary programmes in Law, for that we have BA.LLB programme.

1.3.CURRICULUM ENRICHMENT

1.3.1. How often is the curriculum of the University reviewed and upgraded for making it socially relevant and/or job oriented / knowledge intensive and meeting the emerging needs of students and other stakeholders?

The curriculum of the university programme courses of each department is being revised in every 4 years and reviewed once in every year annually. However, whenever the changes occur in the contemporary society, appropriate modifications to the curriculum in force, are being incorporated by the board of studies after the thorough discussion and deliberations. At the department level, the board of studies meeting is mandatory every year. However, the local need

based requiremental meeting are held by the university in a routine manner convened by the vice-chancellor to meet the required up-gradation passed on socially relevant, job oriented/knowledge based intensive and emerging needs of the students every year introducing changes in the course curriculum. The academic council meets twice in a year to discuss and approve the changes recommended by the respective board of studies.

In a strong manner and basic principle, the university believe significantly that the curriculum should be revised within every 4 year duration of the time period as per the contemporary requirements of the society with its urge towards socio-beneficial aspects, besides complying with the guidelines prescribed by the apex regulatory bodies. Though the Vice-chancellor of the University, during the board

meetings while addressing the meet, generally outlines the relevant issues and basically the strategies to be adopted for the revision and modification of the existing programmes. The task of proposing revision to the curriculum is to be initiated by the board of studies as mentioned earlier already to be known and such modifications are to be incorporated by the board prior to which the following are taken into account only after which the strategies are adopted;

- Guidelines framed by the UGC and other regulatory bodies.
- The model curriculum developed by the UGC are taken into consideration for revising the existing course curriculum.
- Structured feedback from every educational area stimulating academic growth.
- Employability and skill oriented detailed advancements and information promoting as priority for course curriculum.
- Contemporary societal need and benefits with socio-beneficial aspects.
- Techniques imparting students' access technology based demands.
- Value based education with cultural ease
- Global requirements with adoption of inter-disciplinary approach.
- Channels for higher degrees for students opportunities towards vertical mobility
- Keeping abreast of events in relevant disciplines.

1.3.4. What are the value-added courses offered by the University and how does the University ensure that all students have access to them?

To impart the values among the students of the University, a strategic tie-up with an Institution of National Importance i.e. **Sri Aurobindo Society, Pondicherry** has been done. It feels proud to say that CVRU is the only university of Chhattisgarh which has been given Deendayal Upadhyay Kaushal Kendra by UGC and MHRD. The UGC has been allotted us M.Voc. and B.Voc programmes in Telecommunication, Retail Management & IT and Manufacturing which also gives us research programme in vocation (NSQF Level 10) offering B.Voc. from session 2015-16. CVRU is the only university which offers NSQF level 1 to NSQF level 10 programmes.

1.4.FEEDBACK SYSTEM

A formal mechanism has been developed by the university to get feedback from the students regarding the curriculum for obtaining better outputs. Feedback on the curriculum is obtained from the

students, faculty, alumni, industry experts and other public domains etc. in a proper manner and regular basis periodically. The departmental head of each department collects the feedback from the students through the faculty members and then submit it to the faculty deans for further processing. The dean then outlines the filtered outputs and marks it to the academic council for the necessary steps after discussion in the board of studies. In the next step, the vice-chancellor takes the fixed decision for the feedback results so obtained and also the faculty and industry feedbacks are taken by the vice-chancellor department wise. The suggestions and comments collected from the feedback are placed before all and every academic member of the University for Better Consideration. The feedback system of the university closely monitors the execution of the formal mechanism designed for collection of feedback on curriculum.

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the University ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The university announces admission to its various courses mostly in the month of March & April for its forthcoming academic session through the following processing steps: -

- Admission notification by advertisements in the print media as well as uploading the information in the university website (www.cvru.ac.in).
- Furnishing its detailed information in the university prospectus, admission guideline and also in the local, national & international media using various electronic media.
- The research oriented courses of the university includes its own university entrance examination entitled as CVRU entrance for M.Phil/Ph.D.
- Prior to the admission procedure the campaigning is done by several methodologies which includes organising education fair, science fair, talent search examination, +2 & YOU (Plus two and you) as well as banner, poster, pamphlets, brochures.
- For rest of the courses the university selects the merit list regarding the admission through the application forms obtained applied to its various other courses both in UG & PG level.
- Transparency is ensured in all admission process by means of : -
 - i). Appointment of senior most professors to prepare merit list of candidates pertaining admission to the respective courses.
 - ii). A team of experts consisting of senior teachers of the relevant discipline each constituted by Vice Chancellor to evaluate and assess the performance of the appeared candidates to avoid any kind of objection or mismanagement.
 - iii). The list of the meritorious candidates so prepared is displayed in the departmental notice board of the university campus.

- 2.1.2 Explain in detail the process of admission put in place by the University. Most of the selected courses of the university comprises of the entrance test examination in which some courses involve the entrance procedure by state government entrance exam mode such as, B.Ed. through state pre B.Ed. entrance examination followed by state govt. online counselling. The courses of diploma, degree and Master of Engineering & Technology (Poly, BE & M.Tech.) for its various branches follow PPT, PET, JEE & GATE online counselling. Similarly the course of MBA involves the entrance examination through CAT/MAT.

- 2.1.3 Provide details of admission process in the affiliated colleges and the University's role in monitoring the same.**

Not applicable, as University has no affiliated college.

The university definitely follows the mechanism for complete monitoring and reviewing of the student profile for its departmental admission process. The BOS recommends the intake of the students with respect to their academic profile for further processing through the academic council and the admission committee. After this to put forward the transparency and responsiveness in a greater mode the university further decides to pertain the feedback deliberately by the academic council and admission committee.

Beside the annual income of the parents the university also reviews and verifies the application form on the basis of various other criteria such as: gender, cast, domicile, linguistic, judicial and legal aspect and documentation is done as guided by the university governing body and respective regulatory bodies.

- 2.1.5 What are the strategies adopted to increase/improve access for students belonging to the following categories:**

- **SC/ST & OBC:** The University offers admission to the candidates from all over the country and abroad without any discrimination of caste, creed, religion and sex. However, as per University rules, some seats in all courses, except a few, are

filled through the nomination from the candidates belonging to the special categories including SC/ ST and OBC in order of merit within the category.

- **Women:** To promote the education of women some seats are earmarked in few courses at UG/PG and diploma level. We also offer hostel facilities for the female students.
- **Persons with varied disabilities:** As per UGC rules, 03% of the intake of the seats are reserved for Physically Challenged persons in various Courses as indicated in our Guidelines to Admissions, except a few are reserved.
- **Economically weaker sections:** The Fee Structure of the University has been designed in such a way that gives accessibility to candidates from economically weaker sections. Besides this certain concession are given in the Tuition Fee to the candidates belonging to weaker sections by the Dean Students' Welfare and a number of scholarships are also provided.
- **Outstanding achievers in sports and other extracurricular activities:** A number of seats are earmarked for admission to the Outstanding Sportspersons/Debaters/NCC Cadets in various courses as per university criteria

2.2. Catering to Student Diversity

The university organizes induction programme annually in a regular mode for the students of each and every discipline where the esteem authorities of the university : - Vice Chancellor, Pro-Vice Chancellor, DSW, Dean, Faculty, & Head of the individual departments interact with the new comers and are made aware about the facilities and functions of the university system. On the same occasion the university invites the experienced academicians from the different educational fields to provide significant information, suggestions and motivation regarding the required essential of the students. The prime objective of the august presence of these experts is to deliver the gradual information about the university culture, discipline, code of conduct, facilities and amenities availed by the university for its students.

2.2.2 Does the University have a mechanism through which the “differential requirements of the student population? Are analysed

after admission and before the commencement of classes? If so, how are the key issues identified and addressed?

Admissions to CVRU is given on the basis of merit list. However the information pertaining to the differential requirement of the students' population on the basis of cast, religion, gender, tribe and region are solicited in the admission prospectus supported with the required necessary documents.

During the post admission period the students with low competence level and low IQ level in computer awareness and language proficiency etc. are guided by the extra supporting skill-based programme in their department. Students from the unprivileged poor financial background are provided with the facility of fee relaxation in some cases. The tribal background students are made available with the facility of scholarship as per the government norms/rules/criteria.

2.2.4 Has the University conducted any study on the academic growth of students from disadvantaged sections of society, economically disadvantaged, physically handicapped, slow learners, etc.? If yes, what are the main findings?

On a continuous basis, informally a need based guidance is given at the department level to the students belonging to disadvantaged section of the society with economically, physically, mentally poor learners from all faculties to ensure their academic growth. In the university level the training and placement cell (TPO) assist these student to procure skill oriented activities such as : GD, motivational lectures, PD programmes, interview skills etc. indirectly helping them for the further opportunities regarding job. Beside this the well facilitated central library of the university helps these students by providing required study material, hardware, software and proper internet facilities thereby enhancing their academic growth.

2.2.5 How does the University identify and respond to the learning needs of advanced learners?

The learning needs of advanced learners are identified and responded to, by the teachers in their classroom situations and they are taken care of in tutorial classes. Generally for a better learning, they are given

topics and tasks with higher difficulty level as compared to the slow learners. They are facilitated with an enriched experience through their participation in the different elected bodies of the University, organizing-committees for seminars & conferences, editorial boards of students' magazines of the University. There are provisions for undertaking projects and initiating autonomous academic activities for the advanced learners.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the University plan and organise the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules (academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)?

The University plans the teaching, learning & evaluation schemes in the following manner:

- Before the commencement of new academic session, each department helps the meeting of all the faculty members at the board of studies (BOS) level and carefully plans the teaching learning & evaluation schedules as well as required necessary modifications on the basis of teaching plan submitted by the teachers to their respective departments and thereafter sends it to the academic council for further approval. For the effective preparation of teaching learning process & evaluation schedules the meeting of the academic council is organised as second necessary step headed by Vice chancellor and the consultation of the departmental heads, deans & members for better recommendation is also required and taken on.
- The academic council also decides & prepares the University Academic calendar for all its courses, evaluation system & activities. The academic calendar so prepared according to the semester wise activities annually is circulated throughout the university and also placed in the university website.

2.3.2 Does the University provide course outlines and course schedules prior to the commencement of the academic session? If yes, how is the effectiveness of the process ensured?

Before the commencement of the each semester of the students, the university provides course outlines and course schedule both to students & teachers. The effectiveness of the process is monitored by the head of the department and is ensured through periodic assessment, class test, mid semester examination etc.

2.3.3 Does the University face any challenge in completing the curriculum within the stipulated time frame and calendar? If yes, elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional measures to overcome these.

As each department of the university strictly follows the academic calendar and university schedule, so the university mostly does not face any kind of challenges, obstacle or hindrance in completing the curriculum within the stipulated time frame & calendar. However, in certain cases when the university undergoes through some of its academic activities or curriculum incompleteness due to some unavoidable circumstances with the scheduled time, then it overcomes it by arranging some extra remedial classes and programmes.

To make the study and learning student centric the university performs various activities as its basic philosophy towards student welfare. Different faculties adopt suitable teaching and learning methodologies to involve students and to facilitate participative learning. The faculties of science and Technology predominantly involve the students in their laboratory for practicals as an experiential learning. Most of the courses require field visits to have exposure to realistic domains. The students are involved in their project assignments with various industries. Hands-on-Training in instrumentation, computing and search tools are given to the students to enhance their innovative and interactive grip. The way of project based learning is promoted through which students get the maximum, exposure and freedom to improvise themselves, while displaying their multiple skills. Students are made active by providing them with a platform of competitive environment for inter university and intra university competitions in various student-centric activities study and sports & also extra-curricular activities of different fields through which students get their space to hone their talents and vent out their creativity. The institute of Law conducts the moot courts regularly to facilitate improved student learning. The other faculties of the university involve the students in field surveys, study tours etc. The faculty of commerce and Management gains the hands in experience for students during the internship. The faculty of Engineering & Technology involves the students in industrial experiences etc. All the programmes in every faculty contain student presentations, seminars, group discussions and assignment as a common perspective. The use of ICT in teaching-learning and use of the University Community Radio i.e. Radio Raman 90.4 further

strengthens of the teaching-learning process in CVRU is to develop skills and competencies among the students to make them self-independent.

2.3.5 What is the University's policy on inviting experts / people of eminence to deliver lectures and/or organize seminars for students?

For the research & PG students each department has an internal procedure in which the department invites eminent professors, scientist, public speakers and experts from different disciplines on specific issues individually. Discussion/lectures are then held as per the need of the students. Endorsement lectures are arranged in the different subject periodically for the purpose to encourage the department and its students. All the academic department are encouraged to invite the people of eminence from different field and decide to organise seminar, conference, workshop, symposium etc. simultaneously. There is a provision in the university to appoint the visiting fellows for the department who will deliver the expert lecture to the students. Successful Alumni visiting the department are also requested to deliver some lectures during their visit.

2.3.6 Does the University formally encourage blended learning by using e-learning resources?

The CVRU has a online database of e-resources like adequate web resources on all the courses of study are available in the university and the CVRU encourages blended teaching and learning. In addition, students are also provided e-books, NPTEL learning soft copies. Teacher enjoys autonomy in their teaching methodologies through which they improvise to blend – learning resources. Students are also encourage to adopt the e-learning resources of learning in their presentations, dissertations and research work through uninterrupted use of Wifi facility in the campus.

2.3.7 What are the technologies and facilities such as virtual laboratories, e-learning, open educational resources and mobile education used by the faculty for effective teaching?

CVRU contains a big electronic database available through the connection of LAN on the campus through which an e-learning resources and the teachers have unique opportunities for device innovative method of teaching. The following facilities help the students and the faculty in their technological aspects to keep pace with the recent development : -

- Electronic learning facilities with NPTEL programme.

- Internet based resources collection.
- EDUSAT programme.
- Access to e-book & Journals.
- ICT based interactive teaching learning using protections.

2.3.8 Is there any designated group among the faculty to monitor the trends and issues regarding developments in Open Source Community and integrate its benefits in the University's educational processes?

To monitor the trends and issues regarding the contemporary developments in the relevant disciplines, the CVRU designate of special group at the university level. The Academic Council involves the participation of industry experts other academic experts and discusses the new trends and needed changes in the academic programmes to integrate the benefits of the development in open source community towards the University's educational processes. The Board of studies acts as the responsible body to monitor the advanced trends and modern issues on the subjects in its jurisdiction at the departmental level. The University research committee at the departmental level is also responsible to monitor the issues related to contemporary research. This forum organizes special lectures frequently to deliberate on new research trends. The special group of senior faculties, professors and faculty Deans at the University from each department is designated to monitor the issues regarding the University's education processes.

2.3.9 What steps has the University taken to orient traditional classrooms into 24x7 learning places?

The following major steps has been taken by the university to orient traditional classrooms into 24*7 learning places.

- Provides uninterrupted wi-fi networking facilities throughout its campus and online e-resources are accessible to the students.
- Library remains open to the maximum duration of a day (18 hours) to facilitate student's need.
- Laboratories & research facilities are available all time for the students.
- The students get communicated with their teacher through online system about assignment & tasks.

2.3.10 Is there a provision for the services of counsellors/mentors/ advisors for each class or group of students for academic, personal and psycho-social guidance? If yes, give details of the process and the number of students who have benefitted?

In each department the students are divided into small groups consisting of 6 in each group which is attached to a teacher counsellor in the very beginning of the academic session. This helps in promoting close and gradual interaction among the students & the teachers. A record of the counselling activities carried out by the teacher counsellors in guiding the students to solve their academic & personal problems is maintained throughout. CVRU has invited Puri Shankaracharya, Chetan Bhagat, Dr. Ujjwal Patni the motivational speaker & international pilot trainer to create a value added value based curriculum of life and enhance reading and learning skills of students. It also creates a leadership model where every students stands for something that is bigger than them. In this programme maximum students of the university get benefitted. Each department has a committee comprising teachers & students representatives for counselling the students against ragging etc. the students received academic guidance as well as socio-cultural guidance about the campus from prominent professors of the university.

2.3.11 Were any innovative teaching approaches/methods/ practices adopted/put to use by the faculty during the last four years? If yes, did they improve learning? What were the methods used to evaluate the impact of such practices? What are the efforts made by the institution in giving the faculty due recognition for innovation in teaching?

- Considerably, most of the departments in academic, have improved their infrastructure incorporating state of- art Conference rooms, seminar Halls, with presentation facilities, e- classrooms etc. to provide latest technological exposure to the students.
- Academic competitive events such as quiz, debate, extempore, elocution, collage, Group discussion (GD) etc. are organized for the students of every discipline.
- The technological resources with audio- video facilities and modern teaching aids are actively incorporated in the teaching- learning process of the university in each faculty.
- Various technological workshops such as “Robotics” “Industrial Automation” etc. are arranged for the students to improve their innovative pedagogical skills.
- Through these innovative approaches/ practices, students have provided positive feedback within last four years, as well as from the very beginning.

2.3.12 How does the University create a culture of instilling and nurturing creativity and scientific temper among the learners?

CVRU has an established culture of nurturing creativity and scientific temper among the learners, in which some activities are up regularly for the required specific purpose.

- Both intra- University and inter- University Competitions and exhibitions are conducted periodically relating to the scientific as well as cultural events.
- As the University is a member of AIU (Association of Indian University), it promotes the compulsory participation of its students in the AIU- youth festival with various musical, cultural fine arts, and literary events at CVRU inspiring the students for getting their platform and achievement towards national & International levels.
- The successful scientists of National & International repute are incited to the University to deliver the expert lecture with frequent & regular interaction with the students promoting scientific temper & Flavour.
- All the individual departments organize various scientific programmes and conduct seminars, symposia, workshops etc. separately in which the students get the opportunity to present their papers (oral/poster) and the prizes & awards are arranged for the best students according to their performances.
- Students themselves organize the science festivals, science exhibitions, science contests and other competitive meets at their own level in their respective departments.

2.3.13 Does the University consider student projects mandatory in the learning programme? If yes, for how many programmes have they been (percentage of total) made mandatory?

Yes of course the university consider the student projects mandatory in most of its learning programmes 100% of PG as well as research programmes are having the student project mandatory in their curriculums, whereas the UG level includes submission of the students projects as a part of their degree programme in the pre-final year as well as the final year for all the department of the faculties.

Presently there is no short fall of human resources to meet the requirements staff profile & the evaluative reports of each department

All the teachers have an internet access to e-resources of the central library.

- Inviting experts to interact with the faculties.

Applications are sought from all parts of the country to ensure the quality of teachers at the entrance level. Selection committees are constituted and selection is done purely based on merit, academic qualifications, experience and performance in the interview. A through

screening of the documents and claims made by the applicant is undertaken by the selection committee of University.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

- 2.5.1. How does the University ensure that all the stakeholders are aware of the evaluation processes that are in place?**

The detailed scheme of instruction, examination & evaluation pattern and syllabi are available for all the course at the university campus. Complete ordinances (Academic) and regulation are available on the University website and evaluation process related notices are regularly issued & displayed for the wide publicity of the concerned department /faculty /students. Further, the students are briefed by the departmental heads regarding the examination pattern, distribution of marks and methods of evaluation pattern, distribution of marks and methods of evaluation in the beginning of the academic year itself. Detailed information of evaluation process is posted on the university website and stakeholders are provided the opportunity to know the process, get aware of the complete procedures & get their clarifications. The

students are made aware of the procedures as the total performance within a semester and the continuous performance from the second semester onwards is indicated Grade point Average (GPA), cumulative grade point average (CGPA) and over all weighted percentage marks (OWPM) respectively. Hence, CGPA & OWPM are the real instructors of the students' performance.

2.5.2. What are the important examination reforms initiated by the University and to what extent have they been implemented University Departments and affiliated colleges? Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the examination management system?

- Examination answer scripts have been modernized with a confidential code so as to eliminate any chance of suspicion or unfair means.
- Introduced choice based credit system for both UG & PG courses and other professional courses.
- Introduced various job-oriented professional courses with advanced examination pattern.
- Continuous evaluation process.
- Result of most of the course gets computerized.
- Examination forms are made available in the CVRU website.
- Results of most of the course are computerized.

The average time taken by the University for Declaration of examination results for its various programmes is as follows:

University declare results through departmental Notice Boards. A copy of Result Sheet (TR) is also available in the concerned Department so students may easily see their results.

2.5.4. How does the University ensure transparency in the evaluation

process? What are the rigorous features introduced by the University to ensure confidentiality?

To ensure transparency in the evaluation process, the revaluation of the answer booklets are open for all in each subject paper of the course in case of any kind of grievance from the examinee also, the students are given an opportunity to apply for recounting if they are not satisfied with the results. The photocopy of the answer booklet is also provided on request for verification through RTI. Some of the rigorous feature introduced and adopted by the University in its evaluation process to ensure the confidentiality are mentioned below. The University receives the answer scripts from the centre in a sealed bundle.

- Examiners are recommended by the Board of Exam (BoE) of the concerned departments for the central evaluation.
- Confidentiality is maintained throughout the system and the process very strictly.
- Confidential coding of the answer booklets are being done in all the course subjects thoroughly maintaining the academic standard and confidential status.
- The coded answer sheets are sent for evaluation to the spot chief examiner.
- The foils and counter foils of the coded answer booklets are filled and sealed separately under the strict supervision of the Dean of examinations in the confidential section of the University.

2.5.5. Does the University have an integrated examination platform for the following processes?

The University has its own examination platform for the complete examination process with a full-fledged office of the controller and the superintendent of the examination as the “Exam control room” with a proper arrangement and establishment of the exam process to be carried out smoothly by the sufficient number of exam control room staffs.

- ❖ *Pre-examination processes* – Initially the notice is circulated for the exam form fill-up. The list of students who filled the exam form is prepared and registered. The next steps in the pre examination process are processed in a sequence as preparation of exam time –table subject wise and faculty wise, generation of OMR sheets, OMR student list generation, preparation of sitting plan and sitting arrangement, roll number generation and roll – list display, assigning work confidentially for question paper

preparation, squads and invigilators duty appointment, attendance sheet preparation, admit card gateway etc.

- ❖ *Examination process* – Examination material management, attestation form preparation and distribution, logistics etc. The University has its own in house facilities for typing, printing and copying etc. All the work and activities related to the examination material is being done in the exam office confidentially maintaining extremely tight security under the supervision of the AR-Exam. The examination materials such as answer booklets, question papers, attendance sheets etc. are delivered to the exam control room within the campus and are thereafter collected under security with confidentiality by the control room university staff members.
- ❖ *Post-examination process* – Attendance capture, answer-booklet coding and evaluation, OMR based exam result, TR auto processing, generic result processing, mark sheet distribution & certification, etc. The processing of the result is done using the software available in the examination department which also enables the processing of the mark sheets and certificates, the results are notified within the stipulated time on the individual notice boards of the departments. Certification of the degrees are done as and when the candidates apply for it.

2.5.6. Has the University introduced any reforms in its Ph.D. evaluation process?

The University has adopted the UGC Regulations of 2009 on M.Phil. and Ph.D. programmes as per the norms which expects the research scholars to go for necessary publication of research papers and other requirements before the final submission of the thesis. The University strictly adopted the UGC guidelines and follows it with respect to admission, examination and evaluation of its Ph.D. degree programme and has amended its rules as follows:

- The University has initiated computerization of the exam official process in the controller of examination office and the data management system has improved significantly through complete computerization and also the grievance settlement processes are also made simple.

This potential is integrated by the University for the students through the graduate attributes such as Linguistic proficiency, Communication Skill, interview skill, knowledge based rich cultural value system, Scientific temperament, tolerance, Team work, and coexistence in the curriculum among the students inculcated through the academic curriculum and extra-curricular activities combined with life. While designing and developing the course structure and curriculum, these

graduate attributes are also developed with planning and execution ensuring that they are properly addressed. The teaching plan, pedagogical methods and tools in the teaching learning process facilitates proper execution towards the graduate attributes. The outcome is assessed in the form of clarity of goal formulation feedback and expectation from the students, alumni, parents and employers. The successful placement of the students becomes the measurable indicator for assessing the outcome of clarity in graduate attributes.

2.6.2. Does the University have clearly stated learning outcomes for its academic programmes / Departments? If yes, details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

While designing a course programme, The Board of studies clearly states the learning outcomes. The students and the faculty are communicated for the learning outcomes well in advance with the academic programmes to enable them to plan accordingly. To ensure that the outcomes of the program are met through the courses offered, Some mapping is done and some learning objectives are taught and reinforced throughout the curriculum such as communication skills including speaking and listening, skill, writing skills, Interpersonal skill, Computational skills, Entrepreneurship skills, Problem-solving skill, and multicultural awareness.

2.6.3 How are the University's teaching, learning and assessment strategies structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

To facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes, the University Structured its teaching, learning and assessment strategies in the following manner:

- Proper planning of assignments, topics and assessments.
- Communicating objectives to the students in advance, allowing them to make informed static decisions before enrolling to monitor and direct their own learning objectives.
- Complete processing of structured semester system.
- Development of infrastructural facilities with respect to effective communication by providing language labs.
- Easy access to the students and faculty to e-learning resources
- Advanced class-room Teaching, self-learning scheme of students, group learning, experimentation, projects, field study, Group discussions and seminars, departmental subject presentation, debates, conducting academic event, participation in inter-University & intra-University competitions, sports music, cultural

activities etc. to achieve intended learning outcomes for student specific assessment.

- Regular class-tests, mid-term exam, and subjective feedback, sessionals etc., are also used to assess the general performance and progress of the students.

2.6.4 How does the University collect and analyse data on student learning outcomes and use it to overcome the barriers to learning?

Each and every academic department of the University plans and executes the academic programme activities of its own and analyses the data on student learning outcomes. The Head of the department collects the data on the student learning outcomes and the analytical report is placed before the departmental committee and staff Council for better assessment to develop plans for further improvement. If barriers to learning are identified, the academic bodies address them and verifies that no barrier should exist. If necessary, the department seeks the support of the central administrative office for facilitation of the infrastructural requirements and other needs to overcome the barriers in learning of students. For monitoring the student learning outcomes, the IQAC i.e., the Internal Quality Assurance Cell of the University also identifies the problems and impediments after a thorough analysis of the data given by the departments and subsequently corrective measures are taken by the University thereafter.

2.6.5 What are the new technologies deployed by the University in enhancing student learning and evaluation and how does it seek to meet fresh/future challenges?

The University has provided all the facilities and amenities which caters to the needs of all the students:

- Well-equipped library with e-library facility and access to e-books and journals.
- ICT-enabled classrooms.
- Well-equipped laboratories with modern & advanced Technologies.
- Wi-Fi Campus with all system internet facilities.
- Audio-Video teleconference systems.
- Multimedia based instructions.
- All laboratories and library are equipped with latest versions software
- Class rooms are set up with radio connectivity.
- Broadcast radio programmes, for students of the university and local community surrounding by the university, in different areas like

health, yoga, agriculture, science and technology, clean India, folk cultural and some entertainment.

- Set up solar energy system for power generation, and it is also useful for enhancing the knowledge of students in the area of renewable energy
- We established biogas plant for facilitating the laboratories
- Use of biometric and digital verification.

The University definitely has a Research Committee for the promotion of research & to monitor all activities regarding research related issues in the University. The CVRU Research committee act as the apex Body and initiates the following responsibilities:

- Conducting entrance exam followed by interview of the candidate for selection of Research scholars.
- Monitoring the progress of Ph.D/M.Phil. students time to time at least in every 6 months, where the student has to deliver a presentation on the progress achieved so far for the work carried out.
- Inter disciplinary research is promoted and encouraged by providing wide opportunity throughout.
- Organizing course work and RDC for the work carried out under the respective research field and programme.
- Handling all the research related problem of the students.
- Acquiring the plagiarism software to scan the softcopy of the thesis and to identify the portions of copied information.
- The committee extensively guides the faculties to bring excellency and quality in research work for better output.
- The committee also recommends to publish significant research works carried out by the faculties and scholars in their respective fields through the CVRU research Journal (CRJ/Bharat Journal) published by the University.

The Research committee of the University adopted the following proactive mechanism and takes care of:

- Providing funds for the purchase of equipment.

- Autonomy to the Principal Investigator: for the utilization of infrastructural facilities for smooth conduction of the research work, the University has a policy of giving full autonomy to the principal investigator.

The University undertakes interdisciplinary research involving departments within the University. In the departments so involved the supervisors and co-supervisors are provided from two different departments. The University follows a policy for promotion of interdisciplinary research which is being carried out by roofing the various advanced centres of research within the university campus, actively working on various specialized areas. These centres in the University facilitate interdisciplinary research with collaborative approach towards industries through research tie-up with them. The interdisciplinary research in the University is promoted by activity in the areas related to industry exploration.

CVRU is a private University and as such the polar and non-polar budget covers various allocations i.e. for creating research infrastructure in the departments, purchase of Instruments, books, journals, chemicals, subscription to e-books and maintenance of research laboratories. The budget plan earmarks maximum percentage towards research. Depending upon the requirements of the faculty members and students to encourage research, the university marks extensive budgetary allocation for research work, travel grants for attending National/International seminars, conferences and workshops, organising national/international seminars/conferences/symposium in the university, visiting professors/fellows, faculty improvement, enhancing faculty resources, procurement of books/journals, equipment for laboratories and ICT facilities. Besides, allocation of Rs. 25 lacks is made every year for laboratory procurements like chemicals etc.

In care of recertify and after taking care of teaching department, the University may sanction such leaves.

To facilitate research in the University, several progress and improvements in the infrastructure have been made with the rooms and labs free from dust, aerosols, microbes, dirt, environmental pollutants, unwanted aids, garbages etc. The rooms are well equipped with advanced instrumentation facility, internet facility, uninterrupted power supply, air conditioning, fire safeguard/fire proof, accidental safeguard tec. CVRU also has its field units for field research.

- To facilitate research towards life science, recently a biotech – park and herbal medicinal gardens are developed within the university premises to involve and incorporate a high level research investigation in the field of biotechnology, microbiology, botany, tissue culture, horticulture, biomedicines, photo chemistry and biochemistry etc. and other emerging disciplines.
- The university has also built a significant centre of excellence

named as “CVRU central instrumentation laboratory” (CCIL) which is available in easy use by University staff members and research scholars. The CCIL contains various sophisticated equipment and upgraded existing equipment such as “Atomic absorption spectrophotometer” High resolution microscope, high speed centrifuge, UV – Vis spectrophotometer, water analyser kit, BOD-Incubator, laminar flow etc. to promote research in emerging areas.

- The university provides high band width connectivity and e-research facility and involves advanced and modern strategies for pursuing research by an emerging cutting edge technology to meet the needs of research in various disciplines.

3.3.2 Does the University have an Information Resource Centre to cater to the needs of researchers? If yes, provide details of the facility.

Yes of course, to cater to the needs of research, the university is having an information resource centre for which the facility is available in the CVRU central library. As an information resource centre, the university is an exclusively centralized library with INFLIBNET facility & well e-research facility with computer analyst and specialized software packages for the data analysis in the university e-library. The information are available for the students and faculties on a regular basis providing good connectivity, so that all can access as per their needs.

Yes, as already been mentioned before, the university has science instrumentation centre as a centre of excellence namely “CVRU central instrumentation laboratory” (CCIL) with excellent facilities for the research scholars enabling them for efficient scientific work and approach towards the field of science and technology. Separate budget is provided from the general fund to maintain and develop the central instrumentation lab.

University has a Guest House for the residential facilities equipped

- Promotion of consultancy activity in the campus, by encouraging the faculty members to take up the consultancy works.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 How does the university plan and ensure adequate availability of physical infrastructure and ensure its optimal utilization?

The university has excellent infrastructural facilities including adequate classrooms, high tech seminar halls with interactive boards for classroom teaching, spacious examination and valuation chambers well equipped research labs with sophisticated instruments, and computer labs with fine interact connectivity and all technological access as well as software facilities. Apart from a full-fledged central library, dedicated and well managed departmental libraries are also available in each department. Adequate field units and field work facilities exists in the university for practical classes and research pertaining to the departments of civil engineering, geography, botany etc.

As the infrastructure facilities and learning resources are the key factors for creating the ambience to enhance the productivity of both staff and students in any academic institute, so, CVRU has been constantly upgrading its infrastructure in the last a years since the very day of its establishment, keeping in pace thoroughly with the increasing demand and additional requirements through the financial aspects.

The university infrastructure plan mainly consists of the infrastructure requirements in terms of the growing needs and current demands to ensure its optimal utilization to meet the challenges of changing global education worldwide. The university invests substantially to improve the classroom, library, laboratory infrastructure, administrative infrastructure, books, journals and online resources for teaching, learning and research. The university also has its investments on its own in campus banking infrastructure, ATM, Gymnasium, canteen, guest house, other residential facilities, student hostel for accommodation and mess, community radio station building, own power supply system, additional generators, invertors, water supply systems including the RO and UV water purifiers. To ensure proper utilization, the seminar hall, the ICT enabled class rooms, laboratory etc. are utilized by all the departments in a sharing basis to conduct academic activities, workshops, seminars, conferences etc. For the optimal utilization, the university transport facilities are utilized for field trips, educational trips, industrial visits, study tours and other

extension activities under proper policy management of the university infrastructure plan. The major equipment and other facilities are maintained by entering into annual maintenance plan of university infrastructure caring committee (UICC). Though there occurs sometime inadequate availability of class rooms at certain facilities and resources are shared. The university examinations are staggered and conducted in shifts to accommodate all the departments in the university.

To ensure the plan, the academic as well as the non-academic department makes an assessment of its overall infrastructural as well as all other requirements at the financial year ending and these requirements are debated, prioritized and finalized in the faculty meeting at department level. Then each department submits its plan and proposal to the finance and development section. Thereafter, this unit prepares a consolidated university overall infrastructure and requirement plan and passes to the academic council and executive council of the university for further approval. The work section of the university undertakes monitoring and maintenance of all the infrastructural facilities and attends to each and every complaint immediately.

4.1.2 Does the university have a policy for the creation and enhancement of infrastructure in order to promote a good teaching-learning environment? If yes, mention a few recent initiatives.

Yes, creation and enhancement of infrastructure in order to promote a good teaching learning environment is a primary concern of the university. Hence the university definitely follows its policy towards infrastructure creation and enhancement.

Thus, a few initiatives recently taken by the university incorporate the following.

a) Development & improvement of the campus:

- Promoting green university concept by frequent plantation, excellent gardening, flowering and hedging.
- Installation of firefighting system at each and every building laboratories, library, academic block & administrative block.
- Proper alignment modernization of roads, paths and pavements

- User friendly university website with update information on all academic, administrative and cultural aspects of the campus
- Full time uninterrupted power supply and backup online UPS units in case of any outages.
- Wi-fi enabled campus.

b) Research and academic infrastructure:

- E-classroom facility equipped with electronic team boards, internet & other audio equipment used for interactive teaching sessions.
- Increasing the number of LCD projectors in the departments to enhance ICT based learning.

4.1.3 How does the university create a conducive physical ambience for the faculty in terms of adequate research laboratories, computing facilities and allied services?

The maintenance of ambience of the departmental laboratories is monitored by the respective heads of the departments and the university takes up the work through its engineering office. The university incorporates a great emphasis on providing a conducive physical ambience based on requirements. Thus, more than 75% of the faculty members in majority of the department of studies have been provided with the dedicated space supported by uninterrupted power supply and high speed internet connectivity. Each and every academic department is equipped with adequate infrastructure for teaching, learning and research. Whenever improvements and updating are required the department will be provided with additional financial support and assistance for meeting the requirements. Also, the university entered into the memoranda of understanding with prominent organization and corporates such as TCS, Microsoft, BSNL, Wipro etc. and the alumni also help the university departments to develop good physical ambience and adequate research facilities, computing facilities as well as several other allied services etc. The university has established its research centre in a well systematic and advanced manner with suitable high order instruments for providing adequate research facility to the faculty and scholar. The maintenance of these centres is taken up on priority basis by the university always to maintain the throughout the campus.

The campus internet is fully maintained an optical fibre networking with BSNL lease line 10 mbps high speed internet connectivity 4 mbps from TATA Tele Services. The university has more than 550 computers in its various departments including laboratories, computer labs, English language labs, library, administration and other department of studies specifically of HCL made with core i3/quad core/core 2 duo/Pentium 4 processors with 80GB/120GB/250GB/350GB/500GB HDD and 512MB/1GB/2GB/4GB RAM machines. All the systems are connected through star topology. All the computer systems in the laboratories are finely connected to the LAN systems

4.1.4 Has the university provided all departments with facilities like office room, common room and separate rest rooms for women students and staff?

Not all the departments, but most of the departments in university have facilities of office rooms and common rooms but the university has provided one common room and rest room for the women students and staff not separately for all departments but one separately for the whole university itself.

4.1.5 How does the university ensure that the infrastructure facilities are disabled friendly?

Special arrangements are made for the disabled students in the ground floor only of the academic building and the university central library getting facilitated by the university departments ensuring comfortable movements for the disabled/physically handicapped students. In special cases the facility of the wheel chair is also provided by the university health centre/dispensary. Lift system has yet not been developed but yet to be proposed. Students with multiple disabilities are encouraged to contact the Dean of Student Welfare (DSW) as soon as possible to assess their support requirements.

4.1.7 Does the university offer medical facilities for its students and teaching and non-teaching staff living on campus?

The university has its own health centre and dispensary comprising of two full time medical superintendents, i.e., one chief medical officer and one medical supervisor to cater to the needs of the medical services. The CVRU health centre and the dispensary of the university within its premises offers full time medical facilities for the students, faculties, non-teaching staff, administrative staff and other employees of the university. The dispensary provides service in the hostels also extends its emergency services too throughout the campus. All the students, staff, faculty and other employees of the university are provided medicines at free of cost. One medical officer and one assistant medical officer along with a medical compounder are appointed to take care of CVRU health centre and helps to avail the medical facility for each and every one in the university premises. The health centre of the university consists of the complete first aid facility, primary medical treatment facility as well as some of the diagnostic equipment and sufficient pharmaceutical medical store.

4.2.1 Does the library have an Advisory Committee? Specify the composition of the committee. What significant initiatives have been taken by the committee to render the library student/user friendly?

Yes, as per the UGC norms, the University central library has an advisory committee for its proper management and administration. The committee is headed by the Vice Chancellor of the University. The chief librarian is the convener and the members include the Registrar, coordinator of IQAC etc. The committee also consists of the Dean of Faculties, Dean Student's welfare and three research scholars as nominated by the Vice Chancellor. The functions of the library advisory committee (LAC) are to review the progress and performance of the library and to resolve the issues related to the library building., furniture, equipment, staff, finances, books, library rules, accounts, audit and policies etc. regarding general administration. The action plan is also further prepared by the LAC and frames rules for library management and decides for the allocation of the annual budget for the

purchase of books, Journals periodicals etc. To render the library as user friendly/students friendly the several initiatives and recommendations taken by the University or LAC are mentioned below:

- Extension of “special services” to the users of the all types in the University in a separate manner both for faculty and students by the procurement of social responsibility.
- Maintenance of computer system internet aided facilities.
- Resolved to easy subscription for e-journal and e-books.
- The CVRU Central Library incorporates its contribution in curriculum design & development of the institution by providing the facility of DelNet to the students and contains 50,000 books, National & International Journals as well as digital technology with E-Library software & is also having a membership of various national & international bodies.
- Enhancement of the budget of the library.
- Current awareness service by display of the list of new arrivals.
- Easy availability of instant printing, scanning & Xerox facility.
- Promoting user friendly software.

4.2.2 Provide details of the following:

(a) Total area of the Library: 929 Sq. Mts. = 10000 Sq. ft.

The J.P. Choubey Central Library of CVRU has 10000sq. ft. of carpet area. The work area and stack areas of each section has a seating and reading facility to enable the user to choose and refer the books comfortably. A good ventilation is provided in all the rooms with an enough spacious atmosphere. There is a user friendly seating arrangement provided with sufficient scope for optional interaction among the users.

60 persons can be seated in the library reading room 60 users can sit and use the computers in e-library zone.

(c) Working hours (on working days, on holidays, before examination, during examination, during vacation)

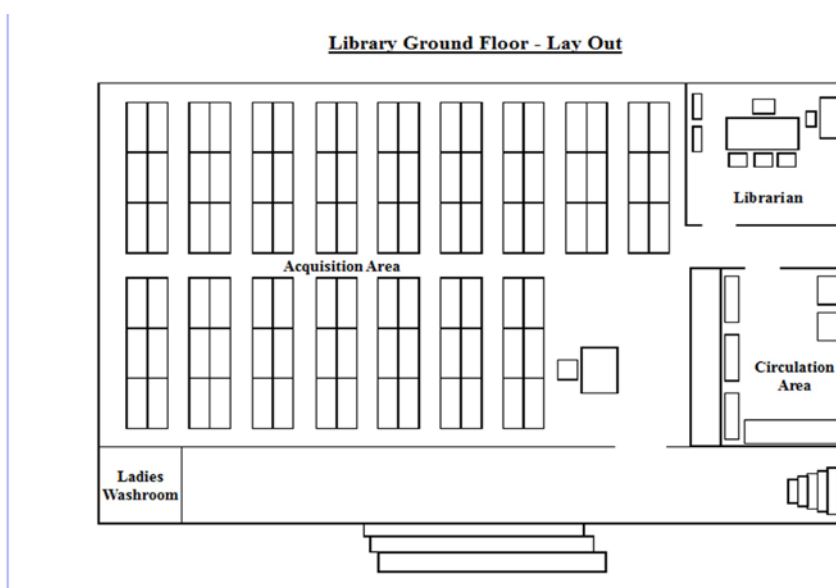

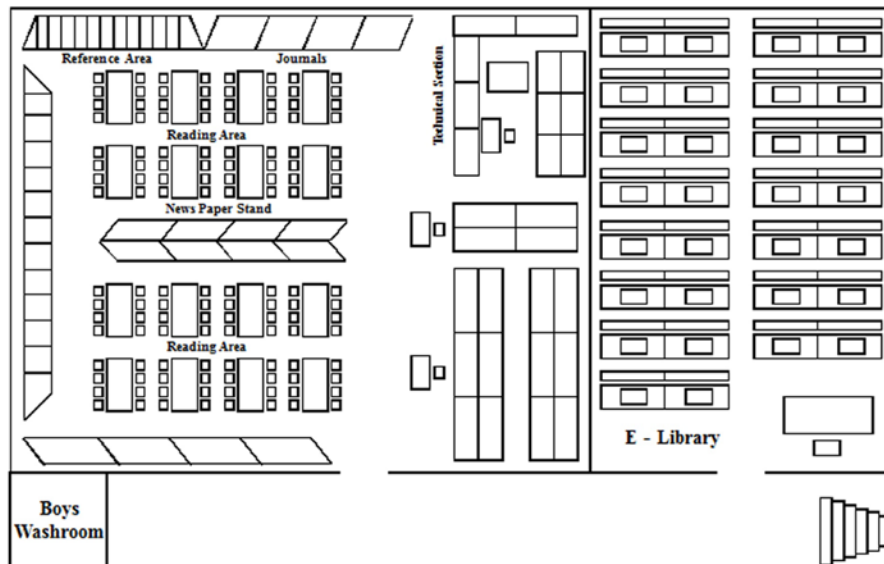
(d) Layout of the library (individual reading carrels, lounge area for browsing and relaxed reading, IT zone for accessing e-resources)

- **Library automation:** The library automation is carried out in order to make it user friendly to facilitate integrated automated operations, all the sections are being connected through local area network (LAN). For access to the master database all the section have computers. Thus, the library automation involves computerization of acquisition, serial, technical & circulation modules.
- **Total number of computers for general access:** The CVRU central library has a total number of 60 computers in which thin clients, Servers, Micro fitsch and Microfilm reader are also available.
- **Total numbers of printers for general access :** 1
- Internet band width speed: 2mbps

- Institutional Repository: The institutional repository contains around full text items and includes journals, papers, book chapters, manuscripts, conference papers, thesis and audio visual presentation.

4.2.7 Give details of specialized services provided by the library with regard to

- **Manuscripts:** The library possesses a collection of 04 manuscripts consisting of both pal leaf and paper manuscripts. Significant among them are commentaries on Vedvyasa's Bhagvad Geeta by Dharmashastra, By Katyaverma etc. also, the original copy of the constitution of India is kept in the library separately. Manuscript collections are maintained and displayed separately rare and valuable collections are maintained in the special reference cell. On request they are made available to the users by the concerned sectional staff.
- **Reference:** The Reference section of the library is yet another place that is proved to be very useful for the users.

- **Reprography/Scanning:** The library provides reprography services at a nominal charge. Only one printer is available and 01 copiers.
- **Inter-library Loan Service:** No
- **Information Deployment and Notification:** Current awareness serviced is utilized for the purpose of deployment of information and notification. After receiving the books from the supplier, the book jackets/covers are copied and displayed on the big display board at the entrance for better deployment of the new book arrival information, the individual departments are also informed separately and intimated about the arrival of new titles.
- **OPACS:** The library collection is available through OPAC and INFLIBNET/DELNET facilities. The library of the University is effectively using the SOUL software for making many records available to the users through online public access catalogue system.
- **Internet Access:** The J.P. Choubey Central Library also provides access to electronic journals and databases for all the university departments using the campus network.

4.2.9 What initiatives has the university taken to make the library a 'happening place' on campus?

The library of the university is reinvigorated as dynamic learning resource and is made into a centrepiece for establishing the intellectual community and scholarly enterprise. The spacious building in a cool and serene environment with a surrounding of greenery, with an availability of huge number of textbooks, reference books, periodicals, journals, manuscripts, collections, epics, encyclopaedia, magazines, newspapers, e-journals & e-books with rapid internet access & connectivity makes the library of Dr. C.V. Raman University as "A Happening Place" on CVRU campus, regarding this, the university has taken several initiatives such as the information of the new arrivals is prominently displayed, deployed and made available in the relevant departments so that it effectively reaches the users. The library is no longer a place for simply searching the information but a place where students consider it as an extension of their class room. By facilitating the availability of group discussion in a room & reading room, the students are encouraged to think analytically and engage in a collaborative learning process where they can develop critical thinking and academic temperament. Also, as the group study is popular and increasingly encouraged by the faculties through assignments, in response, library is provided with a reading room and discussion room for this interactive learning environment. Thus, it is important to accommodate learning through lively group discussions or intense to accommodate learning through lively group discussion or intense conversation while not interfering with the serenity of the library. The CVRU J.P.Choubey central library owes to play a great role in fulfilling the academic mission of DR. C.V.Raman University. The library has a centralized location where new and emerging information technology combines with traditional knowledge resources in a user focussed, service-rich environment that supports learning, teaching and research. The use of electronic databases, digitized formats and interactive media in the library initiates a major shift from the dominance of independent study to more collaborative and interactive learning. The library of the

university is viewed with a new perspective by transforming it from a consortium of only print collection to a vibrant zone of knowledge of integrated IT services through unity of electronic and computer technological process. The information technology in all kinds supplies information throughout the campus instantaneously. The library is a place to access and explore the information with fellow students in a variety of formats, analyse the information and produce a publication or presentation. Also, the has taken the prime initiative of organizing book exhibitions in a special thrust on various occasions in the university in a varying role of the library definitely makes the library “A Happening Place” on the campus.

4.2.10 What are the strategies used by library to collect feedback from its users? How is the feedback analyzed and used for the improvement of the library services.

In order to improve the facilities and to make the library much more user friendly, the library collects feedback from the users in an informal way. The university library obtains feedback from the user community and analyse it with the help of statistical techniques to provide better services to them. The feedback from are designed separately both for faculty members and students including the research scholars. These feedback form formats include the questions regarding the availability of the facilities focussing on the library infrastructure, library maintenance, books and journals availability and accessibility, information deployment and notification, net-browsing facilities and assistance in data searching as well as download and print out facilities etc. a number of users of various departments each from faculty members and students consisting of different categories of disciplines visit the library every day in a frequent scheduled manner, and library are identified and discusses in library advisory board meeting chaired by the vice-chancellor in front of improvements required for the library services are initiated based on the recommendation of the advisory committee and then the implementation of all the initiatives are carried forward to be done successfully.

4.2.11 List the efforts made towards the infrastructural development of the library in the last four years. Purchase of computers, textures & furniture’s equipment etc.

To maintain and develop the infrastructure of the university library, the efforts are made continuously from the last four academic years such as:

- Extension of the library building in a more efficient one

- Purchase of better quality furniture (Almirah/books shelves/chairs/tables/carpets etc.)
- Installation and fitting of generators and invertors etc.
- Improvement of the entrance & front inlet view.
- Construction of additional space and area for the internet browsing and e-library as well as separate reference section.
- Purchasing of audio video materials and accessories etc.
- Extension of IT, electronic and networking facilities for providing smooth access to the e-resource.
- Providing the facility of library educational materials of public access for broadcasting through the use of university in campus community radio, “90.4 Radio Raman” by its establishment

4.3 IT Infrastructure

4.3.1 Dose the university have a comprehensive IT policy with regard to listed parameters such as IT Service Management, Information security, Network security, Risk management, Software Asset management, Open source resources and Green Computing?

Although the university does not have comprehensive policy or well defined and declared IT policy with regard to the above listed respective parameters up to a fair degree, but though all these parameters are in practice. The IT service management, information security, network security, risk management, software asset management, open source resource and green computing are in a good practice of bringing glorified research facilities.

IT Service Management: As already discussed before, that the University has established a separate computer centre (CVRUCC) head by a director for the effective management of IT services. The required infrastructure for IT service management such as servers, intranet, softwares etc. are procured and maintained for the efficient IT management. The hardware cell facility is also available for the management of all hardware services which provides the network hardware support. The keen objective of this section is to act as a single point of support for all hardware related activities in the university such as designing, procuring, installing, interfacing, troubleshooting and maintaining of IT devices and peripherals.

The IT services system of the university, being the core backbone of the campus networking it employs single mode/multimode optical fibre cable

connecting the various departments and is executing the following facilities and services:

- a) University website maintenance (www.cvru.ac.in)
- b) Mail service maintenance (info@cvru.ac.in)
- c) Antivirus updates/installation in the academic departments
- d) Network security and authentication services
- e) Network maintenance & data maintenance
- f) Other data processing management by providing LAN facility.

The IT service of the university is in the process of expanding its activities to provide assured unlimited campus connectivity to every nook and corner of the university.

In order to meet the future requirements, the University is planning to install and commission a huge data communication network that will act as an internet for the entire university campus.

Information Security: CVRU security mechanism undergoes through various process which helps in achieving for defending information from unauthorized access, use access, use, disclosure, disruption, modification, perusal, recording or any kind of destruction, the university takes and adopts the mechanism towards the information security by :

- a) Implementation of the identification, authentication and authorization mechanism.
- b) Enforcement of guidelines to the users,
- c) Providing the antivirus protection well in place throughout the campus.
- d) Hosting the data on servers in the data centre
- e) Setting up of personal firewall rules
- f) Hardening of computing devices for security
- g) Provisioning of gateway level security
- h) Limiting of open ports
- i) Monitoring of logs, backup of data etc.

Network security: CVRU network security works in multiple layers to mitigate the network threats, firewall and threat management devices are installed. Antivirus and bandwidth management and control are processed for security monitoring of network and also to provide secure remote access, the virtual private network (VPN) is also created in the university campus.

Risk Management: As the risks in a university have the potential to disrupt the achievement of the university's strategic and operational objectives, so, better informed decisions and improve the probability of data backup is regularly done and to enable a resilient network, the servers are mirrored frequently. The principal results and outputs of the risk identification and the administration and then again reviewed by the university. The significant and the main objective of the risk management system in the university is that there should be a minimum adverse effect on the network and computing in the campus in case of failure. Thus, the following risk management methodology is used:

- a) Identification & characterization of threats.
- b) Making assessment of the critical IT assets to specific threats.
- c) Determining the risk
- d) Identification of ways to reduce the risk
- e) Risk reduction measures & their prioritization.

Software Asset Management:

For the software assets management at the university, the model of Microsoft's SAM is followed by CVRU which consists of the four basic steps:

- a) Maintaining inventory of software assets
- b) Software licenses and documentation are organized
- c) Procedures are adopted for the entire life cycle of the software
- d) Keeping the SAM plans current through spot checks and user training.

Open source resources: The faculty & students in the University are encouraged to make sufficient efforts for working on the open source resources for increasing their academic pursuits. A few open source resources are as follows:

Green Computing: Campus sustainability through the reduction of energy usage & reduction in Greenhouse gas emission is the focused mission of the University for the Essential Step towards Green computing. Also, disposing off unused & damaged computers, servers and associated subsystems, like monitors, printers, storage devices, UPS etc. & disposal of hazardous material like batteries etc. is also a major step towards green computing.

4.3.2 Give details of the university's computing facilities, Hardware and software. Details of computing facilities at University computer centre are given below.

- ***Number of systems with individual Configurations:*** The university has more than 550 computers in its various departments including laboratories, computer labs, English language labs, library, administration and other department of studies specifically of HCL made with core i3/quad core/core 2 duo/Pentium 4 processors with 80GB/120GB/250GB/350GB/500GB HDD and 512MB/1GB/2GB/4GB RAM machines. All the systems are connected through star topology.
- ***Computer student Ratio:*** Approximately 1:10
- ***Dedicated computing facility:*** Nil

- **LAN facility:** Both wired and wireless LAN is available of 100/1000. Whole campus is on multi-mode optical fibre network. For wireless connectivity the campus has D-Link-3900 (DAP) wireless controller. For the Router CVRU has the DSR-1000.
- **Propriety software:** Windows (with all Microsoft) and Linux software are available. Software for accounting package – tally, MATLAB, Symantec (Norton) Antivirus, Nod32 (ESET) are also available.

4.3.3 What are the institutional plans and strategies for deploying and upgrading the IT infrastructure and associated facilities?

For developing institutional plans and strategies for deploying and upgrading IT infrastructure and associated facilities, the university consists of a development committee for IT infrastructure which discusses and develops the plans for the up gradation and services of IT throughout the campus. The committee takes decision regarding the IT infrastructure and facilities in consultation with the Principal, Deans, Academic Heads, Director Research, Heads of the departments, Registrar, Admin Heads, and AR of the university. The needs are identified for IT infrastructure in various departments and the report is prepared in a consolidated form. In case of immediate need the committee takes approval from the Vice Chancellor of the University for its Implementation.

4.3.4 Give details on access to on-line teaching and learning resources and other knowledge and information database/packages provided to the staff and students for quality teaching, learning and research.

Data managing software has been installed in the university website of CVRU which creates an online work space to facilitate the storing and transferring of information of the individual and also of the institution itself at various levels. The university central library also provides access to the electronic journals and databases in online mode for all the departments through e-resources and access through DELNET, INFLIBNET, OPAC (SOUL) etc.

4.3.5 What are the new technologies deployed by the university in enhancing student learning and evaluation during the last four years and how do they meet new / future challenges?

As the whole campus of the university is wi-fi enabled, the vendor and facility for e-learning has enhanced the students learning and evaluation process. The education oriented software in the departments named “CVRU-Educom” facilities and allows the student teacher online interaction thereby promoting and enhancing the student learning much

more advanced and technological based. The ICT enabled classroom infrastructure facilities for the for the ICT based teaching environment in all department of the faculties using MPTEL lectures, Sci-Lab, MATLAB etc. helps the students in acquiring education to meet the new future challenges. The new technologies deployed by the university in last four years include the implementation and upgradation of faculties in advanced ICT skills and also skill based learning for the students by including one skill programme and computer course compulsory along with their regular learning courses. Many e-classroom are also available in the campus for advanced e-learning of the students.

4.3.6 What are the IT facilities available to individual teachers for effective teaching and quality research?

All the staff members are provided with the computer facilities with internet connectivity in their departments for their access to the e-resource etc. Prominent e-journal subscriptions are made available for an easy access where the papers and articles can be downloaded. To improve the interaction among students, scholars and faculty, an ICT tools has been provided by the University and all the seminar halls of the departments are provided with LCD projectors. The faculty members are given an opportunity to train themselves through various individual ICT training technology.

4.3.7 Give details of ICT-enabled classrooms/learning spaces available within the university? How are they utilized for enhancing the quality of teaching and learning?

There are 8 ICT enabled classrooms equipped with electronic team boards, audio equipment, internet, LCD projectors and other equipment etc. These facilities allow the interactive sessions and the proceedings can be recorded further.

Every academic department has its own departmental LCD projectors for their use in the classrooms as per the teacher's use and requirement during the teaching. There are systematic computing facilities with sufficient requirements and necessary infrastructure in the university for the effective learning and teaching process.

Further CVRU is in the process of transforming traditional black-board based teaching methodology into ICT-enabled smart classrooms and smart conference rooms in all the sections of academic pursuit and research oriented sections. These will have smart board, projector, visualizer, audio system, touch panel, computer, multipoint conferencing unit (MCU), good

network connectivity, camera and micro phone etc. all integrated into a podium.

Also to reap the benefits of smart classrooms, it is mandatory for any educational organization, to make their teachers as computer savvy and get equipped with all types of hardware and software tools that are necessary for discharging their academic duties according to the need of the hour. Therefore, the university is supporting its teacher in this regard for taking up the challenge.

4.3.8 How are the faculty assisted in preparing computer- aided teaching-learning materials? What are the facilities available in the university for such initiatives?

All the faculty members in the university are well trained and fully assisted to prepare power point presentations for class-room teaching by availing and using the computer and internet facilities provided by the university in their individual departments. Through this facility they get self-trained themselves and could prepare their own computer-aided teaching learning materials. The central library of the university also helps and assists the faculties in preparing the computer aided teaching learning materials thereby helping them in downloading the NPTEL lectures and the accessibility of e-resources from other areas through IFLIBNET/DELNET using the library computing & internet facility of e-library.

4.3.9 How are the computers and their accessories maintained?

All the computers and their accessories are maintained by the University network maintenance department and the hardware maintenance section consisting of several hardware networking engineering and on hardware in charge.

4.3.10 Does the university avail of the National Knowledge Network connectivity? If so, what are the services availed of?

The university has 10 mbps connectivity from the BSNL leas line service through the NMEICT (National Mission of Education through Information & Computer Technology) and 4 mbps from the Tata Consultancy services.

4.3.11 Does the university avail of web resources such as Wikipedia, dictionary and other education enhancing resources? What are its policies in this regard?

The university is availing of the web resources such as Wikipedia, dictionary and other e-learning resources through its internet connectivity of 10 mbps and about 4 mbps connectivity of broadband services. Through

this resource and for all other knowledge enhancing resources, all the faculty members are connected to the campus LAN. The CVRU central library also provides access to the electronic journals and database online to all the faculties of the departments through DELNET and INFLIBNET facilities. A huge number of e-journals on different subjects are available for the users through this service. Also, the free access can be availed for the “journal of the institution of Engineers”.

4.3.12 Provide details on the provision made in the annual budget for the update, deployment and maintenance of computers in the university.

In the session of 2014-15 an amount of approximately 4,71,376/- was spent for the update, deployment and maintenance of the computers in the university campus. The budget provisioned for procuring computers/servers & other related software for the past 2 years is about 16,86,505/-. For the major upgrades and deployment of IT services, the computer sections and the other departments of the university largely depend upon the allocations under the yearly plan of the university from its own internal savings.

4.3.13 What plans have been envisioned for the gradual transfer of teaching and learning from closed university information network to open environment?

CVRU has the following future plans envisioned for the gradual transfer of teaching and learning from a closed university information network to an open environment:

- Strengthening of the student teacher interaction beyond class room (e.g. using the software such as “CVRU Educon” which enables teachers to organize all the contents and streamline the delivery of these contents to the students in an easy way for effective communication).
- By providing assistance to the teaching community and user community in providing the need based information with the application of ICT in teaching and learning process. Though there are guidelines from the NMEICT project, but cut plans have yet been chalked out for the transformation from closed to open learning environment.
- The university is planning to develop blended curriculum incorporating virtual labs and optimal use of MIT, Stanford etc. (e.g. the university is already having NPTEL lectures, Sci Lab etc.)

- Planning to provide fulltime access (24×7) to all credible e-learning resources through facilitators like Google apps etc.
- The university is intending to upgrade its campus network infrastructure in a better advanced technological way.

4.4 Maintenance of Campus Facilities

4.4.1 Dose the university have an estate office/designated officer for overseeing the maintenance of buildings class room and laboratories? If yes, mention a few campus specific initiatives undertaken to improve the physical ambience.

To look after University maintenance system of construction for buildings, classrooms and laboratories etc. the university has a construction and maintenance section which consists of civil engineers with a designated officer other assistant Engineers and various supporting staff with several junior engineers taking core for the maintenance and repair of the academic blocks, labs, power supply, roads, water supply lines, sewer lines, electric lines, and other important services for the improvement of the physical ambience.

During the several last years, some of the initiatives taken by the university to improve the physical ambience in the campus are as follows:

- Renovation of roads and academic blocks and laboratories.
- Renovation of roads and widening of pathways in the campus
- Making the laboratories well equipped up to date with advanced and modern instrumentation facilities and their maintenance.
- Plantation, land scaping and gardening for creating pollution free and dust free environment in the campus.
- Refurbishment undertaken in the library and university health centre and dispensary.

4.4.2 How are the infrastructure facilities, services and equipment maintained? Give details the University has infrastructure facilities in terms of buildings of academic departments & non-academic departments, hostel buildings besides having electricity network in sprawling campus.

The system of maintenance of infrastructure and services in the campus is continuously monitored. The university adopts an impeccable system of monitoring its necessities in maintaining its infrastructure. CVRU allocates a sufficient amount of expenditure towards maintenance of its infrastructure

facilities, services and equipment in its annual budget. The budget is carefully managed by avoiding unnecessary expenditure and wastage in the sprawling campus. As, the day to day maintenance and repair of building roads and equipment is one of the primary responsibility of the university so, the designated officer of the maintenance department and construction section, identifies the required needs along with the physical facilities and plans for the implementation & approval from the committee by preparing a report.

Student Support & Progression

CRITERION – V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

5.1 Student Mentoring and Support

5.1.1 Does the University have a system for student support and mentoring? If yes, what are its structural and functional characteristics?

To facilitate the students in a number of ways, the university organizes and promotes all types of academic activities, games, sports and extra-curricular and cultural activities, every year for their support and mentoring.

The student mentoring and support occupies a central position in the university's overall provisions. CVRU has developed a system of student support and mentoring consisting of many activities workouts and preparations.

The primary features of this system are mentioned below:

- Pre-admission counselling
- Post admission counselling of students
- Providing learning guidelines to the students
- Providing financial guidelines and exam scheme guidance
- Monitoring the anti-ragging cell for the ragging free campus
- Helping students in hostel accommodation
- Availing guidance to the students regarding transport facility
- Making provision for the alumni association
- Providing facility of remedial classes
- Developing organizational abilities and leadership skills.
- Focussing on research thrust areas and building up research capabilities among the students.
- Developing service personality, socialization and ethical character.
- Producing self-ability with high morals, values and ethics
- Introducing and accommodation skilled based knowledge

through skill orientated courses, value added courses and enrichment courses for student enrichment.

- Introducing competency building programmes
- Promoting personality development and improving language skill and communication skill.
- Providing pre placement training and placement support
- Improving physical fitness and promoting gymnasium facilities and sports activities.
- Facilitating proper healthcare and first aid to all the students
- Enhancing cultural events, music and youth festivals to develop and socio-economic understanding and culture among the students.
- Helping in planning of educational tours, study tours and industrial visits for the students.

New academic year starts with proper and smooth orientation of students in each department to make them comfortable and familiar with the department programme, schedules and campus facilities. Every academic department has a mentoring system to counsel and support the students. Guidance is provided to the students for their career opportunities various welfare measures are adopted for the support of students and availed to the students as student support services. The students are provided with all the supportive information through website and notice boards regarding the class work, examinations, results and job opportunities. For the effective implementation of various initiatives required for the students support and mentoring, all the departmental committees are activated. Each faculty members is assigned a group of students for counselling and mentoring. The university provides scholarships to all the SC/ST/OBC students enrolled through a systematic procedure. The infrastructural facilities computers with internet and library facilities are well maintained and made available for the students in a well-structured and efficient manner with respect to the students support and facilitation. Advanced learners are encouraged to participate in all academic events and competitions and also in the cultural fests, technical fests, sports and games. Also, various students' oriented events are organized by the university in campus to promote the talent of the students. The grievance cell of the university takes initiatives and measures for the speedy redressal of the grievances.

5.1.2 Apart from classroom interaction, what are the provisions available for academic mentoring?

Several measures and mechanisms are being adopted and provisions are made for the academic mentoring by CVRU apart from the classrooms interaction:

- Peer group learning is promoted
- Students are provided a systematic way for an opportunity to meet the concerned faculty member for their further discussion and clarification in the subject concerned.
- The teachers are allotted and assigned as guides for undertaking the project work and taking up of the assignments.
- Interactive classrooms boards are used separately for effective learning especially for the slow learners.
- Subjective seminars are arranged by the faculty members specially and then attended and monitored to assess the students' performance to guide them for their further improvement and progress
- Additionally, the special lectures by the educationists, philanthropists, social workers, economists, industrialists and scientists are arranged for the students to inculcate the value based education along with interaction with the experts.
- For the benefit of the students towards attaining their goals, employment opportunities, creative attitude, entrepreneurial skills and communication skills, separate GD classes and counselling classes are arranged separately to train the students.
- Any academic issues, social and personal problems of the students are addressed the teacher-in charges of the classes through the grievance cell.
- Many collections of journals, magazines, epics and other resources are made available for the students in the library along with the books.

5.1.3 Does the University have any personal enhancement and development schemes such as career counselling, soft skill development, career-path-identification, and orientation to well-being for its students? Give details of such schemes.

Though the university does not have any particular scheme for any personal enhancement and development of the students, but the university enhances and promotes the career counselling, soft skill development, career path identification and student orientation towards their well-being throughout the learning session. The university promotes the active participation of the students in social, literary, scientific, managerial, legal, economic, physical, career oriented, cultural and academic events as the philosophy of the university is to encourage its student's participation in various activities for developing their skills and competencies and to foster the holistic development. Development of the soft skills and skill – upgradation are the priorities in the curriculum design of the university. The tribal students and the students of rural background are provided with special attention, extra care and extra guidelines separately for their career path identification and financial guidelines to obtain the genuine social skills.

5.1.4 Does the University provide assistance to students for obtaining educational loans from banks and other financial institutions?

Students in need of the financial support for the purpose of education are assisted for the sanction of the same, but no formal assistance is provided to the students at their level respectively.

5.1.5 Does the University publish its updated prospectus and handbook annually? If yes, what are the main issues/activities/information included/provided to students through these documents? Is there a provision for online access?

The University regularly publishes its prospectus in annual mode and makes it available for the students both in print and as well on the University website with gradual yearly updations. The university's prospectus is published in two principle modes; i.e. the "The University information brochure" & "the student information brochure".

- The "University Information brochure" contains all the offered programme details, course duration and the course details of the University faculty wise in every discipline. A brief history and introduction of the university, admission procedure, criteria and the eligibilities for the respective programmes. It also contains all the required information regarding the students support services, facilities and amenities such as lab, library, transport, health facility, hostels, computers, scholarships, sports, exams, fee structure etc. the prospectus of university information brochure also includes the names and address of the officers

incharges for the duties assigned to them by the university management and administrative system. This information brochure contains all the information accordingly from initial front page alongwith the university preamble, index or content table, institutional vision, mission and objectives etc.

- The second mode of the prospectus is the “student information brochure” which consists of complete syllabus (syllabi) of the course offered in each constituent units with their jurisdiction subjectwise of the respective discipline of the student, exam scheme, exam pattern, entrance test and selection procedure details, mode of exam pattern and the related guidelines regarding the campus rules with Do’s & Don’ts.

5.1.7 What percentage of students receive financial assistance from state government, central government and other national agencies (Kishore Vaigyanik Protsahan Yojana (KVPY), SN Bose Fellow, etc.)?

As the university is situated in a tribal belt of the state of Chhattisgarh within the rural surroundings with an enormous diversity of the biological flora and fauna of its dense green, hilly and forest area; hence, most of the students of the university are from the rural background and tribal sections with a maximum percentage of the students in a huge number are benefitted from the state government scholarships, which can be availed obtained by the students through a systematic procedure with their scholarship ATM cards. Thus, the students of CVRU receive their financial assistance from the state government scholarship scheme. The university provides financial assistance and monetary service to financially backward and economically poor students when in a dire need from the university’s

own savings amount during any special request.

5.1.10 What types of support services are available for –

➤ **Overseas students** – The University provides hostel facility and internet facility through Wi-fi connectivity for the overseas students. CVRU has an advisor in special charge for the security of the foreign students and to take care of their clearance related issues during their stay. CVRU also takes care of their health care, grievance redressal in a fast track, VISA to the dependents, sports and cultural facilities and other support services.

➤ **Physically challenged / differently-abled students-**

- The university provides special support in the examinations for these kind of students
- Provides special facilities in the library

- Gives priority in providing any kind of services.
 - The campus is sensitized to their needs by providing all necessary facilities such as wheel chairs, walkers, etc.
- **SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections:** As already been mentioned before that the university being situated in the tribal belt of rural area, the maximum number of its students are from the SC/ST/OBC category and of rural back round with economically weaker financial status. Thus, in pursuance of the UGC guidelines exclusively for the welfare of the SC/ST/OBC candidates, the duty has been assigned to the database section of the university for the responsibility to deal with the matter regarding implementation of the state governments' and Indian Government's policy for these SC/ST candidates in the admission process and other process in the university for their welfare. The university helps these students to avail the facility of scholarships by the state government and also the priority to the placement support and priority for the remedial classes.
- **Students participating in various competitions/conferences in India & abroad:** The students of CVRU are provided financial support for participating in the workshops, conferences, seminars, symposia, etc. in India and abroad and also encouraged continuously to participate in the various competitions across India students are sponsored for various events like youth festivals inter-university competitions and other competitions conducted by various organizations in India & the dean, students welfare (DSW) coordinates with various agencies and organizations to conduct competitions and conference for the students.
- **Health centre, health insurance etc.:** All the students are provided with the health care medical check-up first aid and other primary treatments in the university's health centre cum dispensary through all the available facilities at free of cost under the supervision of the chief medical officer (CMO) of the university in any sever cases and serious health problem, the CVRU students are recommended to the nearby "Sai Baba Nursing Home", Bilaspur for further Treatment with which CVRU has done the MOU. The health insurance policy & facility for the students at CVRU has yet not been developed till date.
- **Skill development (Spoken English and computer literacy etc.):**

- For the development of better skill among the students of CVRU and to enhance the skilled manpower, the University has already introduced one skill development course, value added course and enrichment course in a systematic manner to the first and last semester of the regular courses for the students of UG & PG regarding the spoken English and computer cognigency etc. compulsorily in all disciplines.
- The extra facility is provided to all the students to develop the communication skills, language proficiency and English language lab equipped with 30 computers of student console, 1 computer of teacher console through the “K-VAN solutions multimedia” language lab software Audio-Visual facility & Head Phones.
- The University also arranges special training to the students for enhancing leadership skills, time management, scientific questionnaire designing, data analysis & interpretation, report writing skills, presentation skills and logistics etc.

➤ **Performance enhancement of slow learners:**

- The slow learners and advanced learners are identified by conducting the periodic class tests and through the teacher in charges of the respective classes.
- Remedial classes are arranged in the required subjects for the slow learners with special lectures arranged on the basics useful to make them understand higher level topics. The use of models during the lecture and audio-visual help them to better understand and cope with the subject.
- In order to enhance the performance of the slow learners, learning teams are formulated. Although no specific policy exists to facilitate the performance of the slow learners, however, the teachers individually also take care of the academic needs of the slow learners.

➤ **Exposure of students to other institutions of higher learning/corporates/business houses etc.:**

- During the training period of students and also during the extra time other than the training periods, students are sent to the institutions of higher learning/industries/corporate in order to make them compete with the other community

through the industrial visits, study tours, educational excursion etc.

- Experts from the industry & corporate levels are invited to deliver the lectures and interact with the students in the university to provide them with industrial exposure and corporate look.
- Experienced learning is given priority in the curriculum.

- **Additional academic support and academic flexibility in examinations –**

As it is already known, being the member of the association of the Indian Universities (AIU), the students of CVRU gets the significant opportunity directly to participate in the National Youth Festival organized by AIU and All India youth and cultural affairs jointly every year in various zones of India. Hence, CVRU students are encouraged, promoted, enhanced and need to prepare and participation in all the extracurricular activities arranged in the youth festival at national level such as music, dance, literature, fine arts, etc. So, the university offers a sufficient academic flexibility and relaxation in the mandatory classroom attendance and examinations to the outstanding student performers.

Also, the same academic flexibility is provided and offered to the outstanding student performers in sports, games etc. in the Intra University or inter university sports tournaments, activities and competitions.

- **Special dietary requirements, sports uniform and materials: -**

Further, the university provides special financial assistance to the students participating in the sports and extracurricular activities for the fulfilment of their extra dietary requirements, sports uniforms and other need based materials etc.

5.1.13 Does the University have an institutionalized mechanism for students' placement? What are the services provided to help students identify job opportunities, prepare them for interview, and develop entrepreneurship skills?

The university has a structured system for guidance and placement of the students. There is a training and placement cell with a training and placement officer (TPO) helping students in getting placements, arranging training and organizing, workshops, lectures, GD mock interviews. The training and placement cell is providing all the supporting services for the career opportunities and placement of the students and developing their entrepreneurship skills. The job

responsibilities of the training & placement office of CVRU generally includes:

- Dissemination to the job oriented information and job related activities in various academic departments.
- To approach interact and invite the companies for the campus placement.
- To coordinate with the placement coordinators and heads of the respective departments.
- To coordinate for the off campus interviews
- To provide training and guidelines to the students as a pre placement activity and prepare them for the group discussions, mock interviews, interviews, writing and preparing their resume/curriculum vitae (CV) and also to develop their EP – skills.
- To invite corporate level speakers for providing efficient guidance, motivation and placement training system management to the students regarding job awareness and opportunities.

The university has fully functional unit as a Training and Placement Office (TPO) to take care of the student requirements of Trainings and Placements. Over the years, the department has maintained symbiotic, vibrant and purposeful relationship with Industries across the country and as a result, has built up an impressive placement record both in terms of percentage of registered students placed, as well as the number of companies visiting the campus.

The alumni association of the university is very active in extending support to the institution in all the spheres. The association is actively engaged in the enrolment of members and persuading them to contribute for the development of the respective department in all possible ways. The alumni of the university are in a prominent position in academic institutions judiciary, administration, politics, journalism, arts, humanities, scientific and technological institutes, R and D laboratories, IT companies, industries, health and engineering section. Many of the alumni of this university occupied important positions in the government administration and research

organizations also and also some are settled and working in the abroad countries too in various public sector and private sector organizations. Thus, alumni are contributing in a good proportion for the development of the university.

The university does have a student grievance redressal cell constituted with university officers. At the university level, the vice chancellor, along with all the deans and certain other officers of the university meets the students on each scheduled day decided by the grievance redressal cell and most of the grievances related to their examinations, results, learning and any academic issues and other issues on the campus life are discussed and given a hearing to these grievances formally and informally to provide the redressal. The discussion regarding the “students” conduct and discipline rules are also entertained.

(ii) Establishing a cell and mechanism to deal with issues related to sexual harassment:

As already mentioned before that a “Women Grievance Cell” is set up by the university to deal with all the issues related to sexual harassment and consists of a systematic mechanism.

Yes, an anti-ragging committee has been constituted in the university which remains very vigilant and active throughout the session every year. As, Dr. C.V. 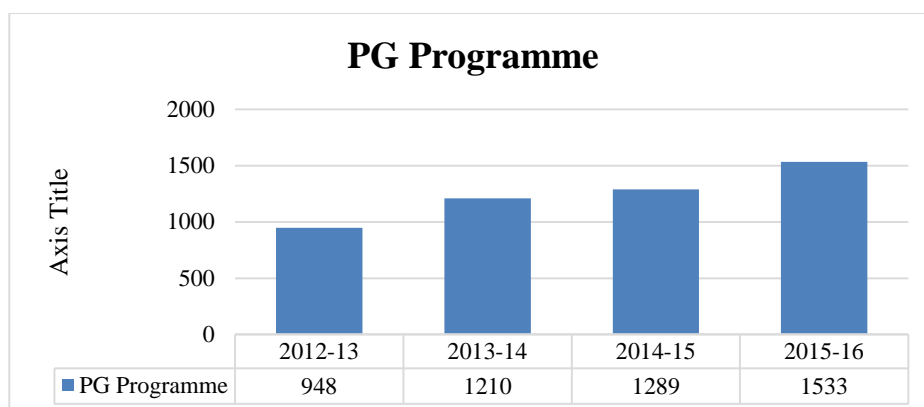
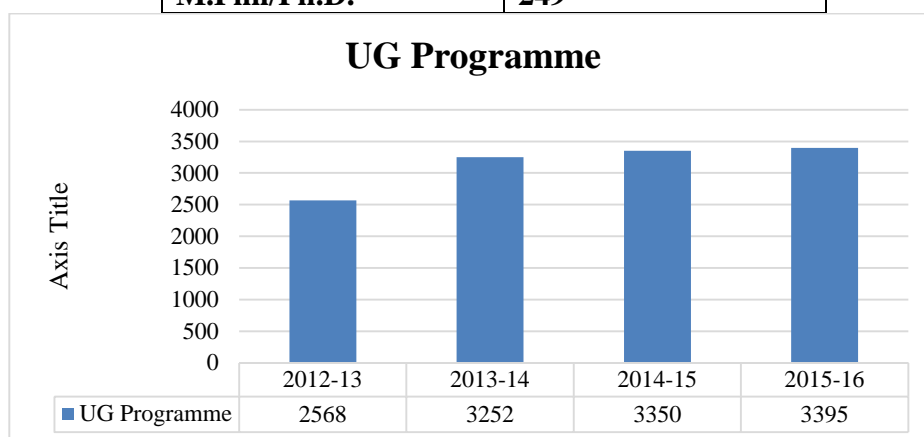

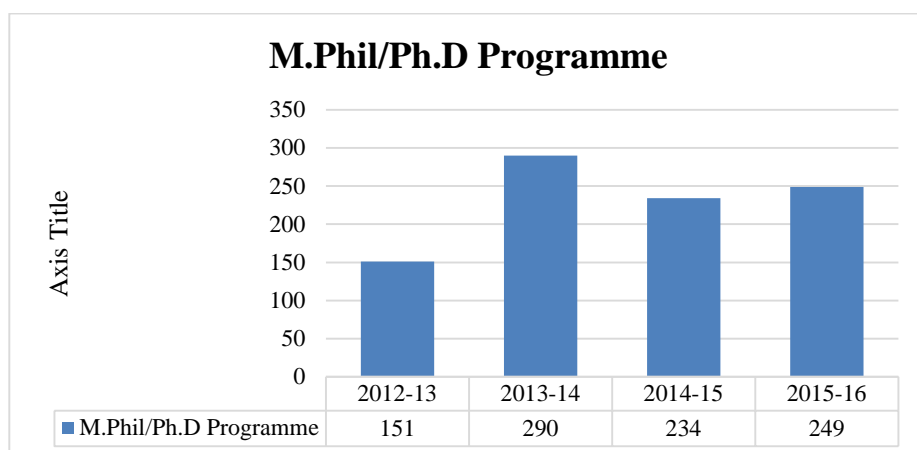
5.2 STUDENT PROGRESSION

Analysis of the programme wise available data reveals that there is a steady increase in the strength of the students admitted in the PG Courses of the university during the last four years, while the students strength for the admission in the UG programmes became static and in balanced equilibrium after a sudden increase before the last session. Whereas, the number of student enrolment in M.Phil. and Ph.D research programmes got a slight decrease gradually. However in the M.Phil. and Ph.D. programmes, the enrolment of the students depend on the availability of the seats under the teacher guides for which as per the rules, a professor can have maximum of five research scholars, on associate professor can have four and an assistant professor can have three at a time.

6.1.3 How is the leadership involved?**a) In ensuring the organizations management system developing implementation and continuous improvement?**

Regular meetings and interactions with the stake holders are held. The main bodies involved are academic council (AC), board of studies (BoS), board of management (BOM) & Board of Exam (BOE). A continuous process of democratic brainstorming and discussions on the various issues at hands for the University are taken up by the leadership with each and every representative body of the teachers, students, and non – teaching staff in valid mediums of interaction through these bodies. In these meeting the representation of various categories/ provisions are made. The academic council is the apex body chaired by the vice-chancellor of the university to review the academic programmes and to suggest new changes, improvements and implementation. The board of research studies reviews the progress of the research in the university and develops plans for quality management and advancements in research under the chairmanship of the vice chancellor and the director of research. The board of studies reviews the needs of the discipline and recommends the innovative programmes and changes. The departmental research team in coordination with the research cell takes care of the research related issues. The vice chancellor at the top level and the head of the department at the departmental level manages and plans the processes related to teaching, learning and evaluation. The board of management plans, manages and executes all the issues of the university at the managerial level of processing. The vice-chancellor, registrar and the other administrative officers are involved in planning and development of infrastructure and other support service.

b) In interacting with its stakeholder.

The leadership of the university interacts regularly with its students of different groups and collects formal and informal feedback to understand their problems, and to resolve them. To promote industry academia interaction, the university leadership organizes periodical meets for its stakeholders. The eminent educationalists, industrialists and prominent leaders from various fields are invited to the campus to facilitate interaction with faculty and students. By providing a democratic survival to all the bodies, all teaching staff and technical staff, University enhances the leadership qualities amongst these members. The statutory members and representative bodies have their own democratic associations and they participate in the decision making process. Participation of all the bodies inculcates leadership quality among these faculties.

- 6.1.10 Has the University evolved a knowledge management strategies? If yes, give details.**

The university has a sound knowledge management strategy to utilize the knowledge of all its stakeholders, such as faculty, students, non-teaching staff members, research scholars etc., for improving the academic standards and to disseminate knowledge through team work. The knowledge management strategy mainly focuses on creation of knowledge and its dissemination through the participative management at various levels.

So, for the effective implementation of knowledge management, the university has formulated various committees. Also for the designing, developing and monitoring the research activities in the university, various initiatives are taken and strategies are made as well as teams are formulated by the university research cell to carry out the knowledge

management further in an extraordinary vast expansion. At the university level, the management review meetings with vice chancellor in chair are organized periodically as a monthly meet to identify the opportunities for improvements.

Knowledge created and generated in the university is documented at a central place and is made available through electronic and print media.

CVRU has its gigantic library with separate sections in which important knowledge documents have been preserved from the past.

6.1.11 How are the following values reflected in the functioning of the University?

a) Contributing to national development.

The university is contributing to the national development in number of ways. Such as, the university contributes to the quality human resource for the development of the nation by imparting skills required to the students from time to time. The university owes to develop global personalities by developing quality education system and produce a huge number of students who can play significant role in the development of the country. On the research front of view, right from the inception, the university focusses on the quality research contributions, also, the university plays its role in promoting industry and business based education for strengthening the economy of the country which cannot be ignored. Thus, the university adopts an exclusive strategy and is involved inclusively in all sections of the society for the national development. The contribution can also be seen in sports, cultural activities and other service activities. During the past several years CVRU has produced a number of graduates and many post graduates for the nation as well as the world. Apart from producing professional workforce, it has also produced educated citizens in the field of science, humanities, technology, management, engineering, teacher education, legal education and so on. Teachers also contribute significantly to the nation & its development by their national research output.

b) Fostering global competencies among students

With the onset of globalization and sweeping economic reforms, much attention is to be paid to promote a global competition in the country. The competitiveness of a country at a global level has been obviously influenced by the respective country's ability to maintain quality at with acceptable standards and delivery mechanism. Thus, in this process of global competitiveness, universities play a key role in developing human resources with requisite quality and skill. Hence, Dr. C.V. Raman

University took all measures to foster competencies of global standards among its student. The university established linkages with many industries and organizations and the students are thereby trained in these sectors. Therefore, the students acquire skills of globally acceptable standards, the university offers admissions to foreign students also to promote global competencies among its students. CVRU also changes its curriculum in frequent intervals to suit the changing global needs accordingly. CVRU adopts the teaching learning methodologies on par with the global standards of education. Students are promoted and facilitated to engage in activities like online discussions forums and groups, attending live lecture, debates, extempore, giving online presentations in the conferences, seminars etc.

c) Inculcating sound value system among students.

The role of educational institutions is not just confined to imparting the knowledge alone but to shoulder the responsibility of inculcating the desirable sound value system among the students. So, the university is giving priority to achieve this objective. The inclusion of the foundation courses focusing on the Indian culture, heritage, science, civilization, environment and incorporating subject papers on moral values and ethics is a step forward in this direction for inculcating sound value system among the students. NSS and sports classes also deserve worth mention in this direction.

A very strong culture of instilling value system prevails in the university through which the students imbibe the values by way of experience and interaction with their seniors in the hostel as well as cultural bodies in the campus.

d) Promoting use of technology

Besides availability of computer lab with internet facility for students in the department, a high speed wi-fi facility at the campus and hostel nourishes the need of students 24 hrs. Apart all, PCs are provided to the faculty so that they can come up with new ideas and industry trends so as to deliver this knowledge at the classrooms and counselling of students at the time when they face any doubt or problems related to subject. The teachers are also encouraged to publish their own reading materials online which are easily accessible for the students at the time they need and upload their video lectures in the CVRU website as well as in the YouTube.

e) Quest for excellence

All the above activities ensure that there is excellence in teaching and research. The university lays a strong emphasis on providing excellence in teaching learning & research. For achieving excellence in its programmes and procedures, CVRU adopts a structured and scientific quality management system following an ISO 9001: 2008 standard with GUJ/Q-1280 as its assessment certification number. The University is also involving all stakeholders such as employers, faculties and students etc. to achieve excellence in imparting knowledge through interdisciplinary approach.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Does the University have a perspective plan for development? If yes, what aspects are considered in the development of policies and strategies?

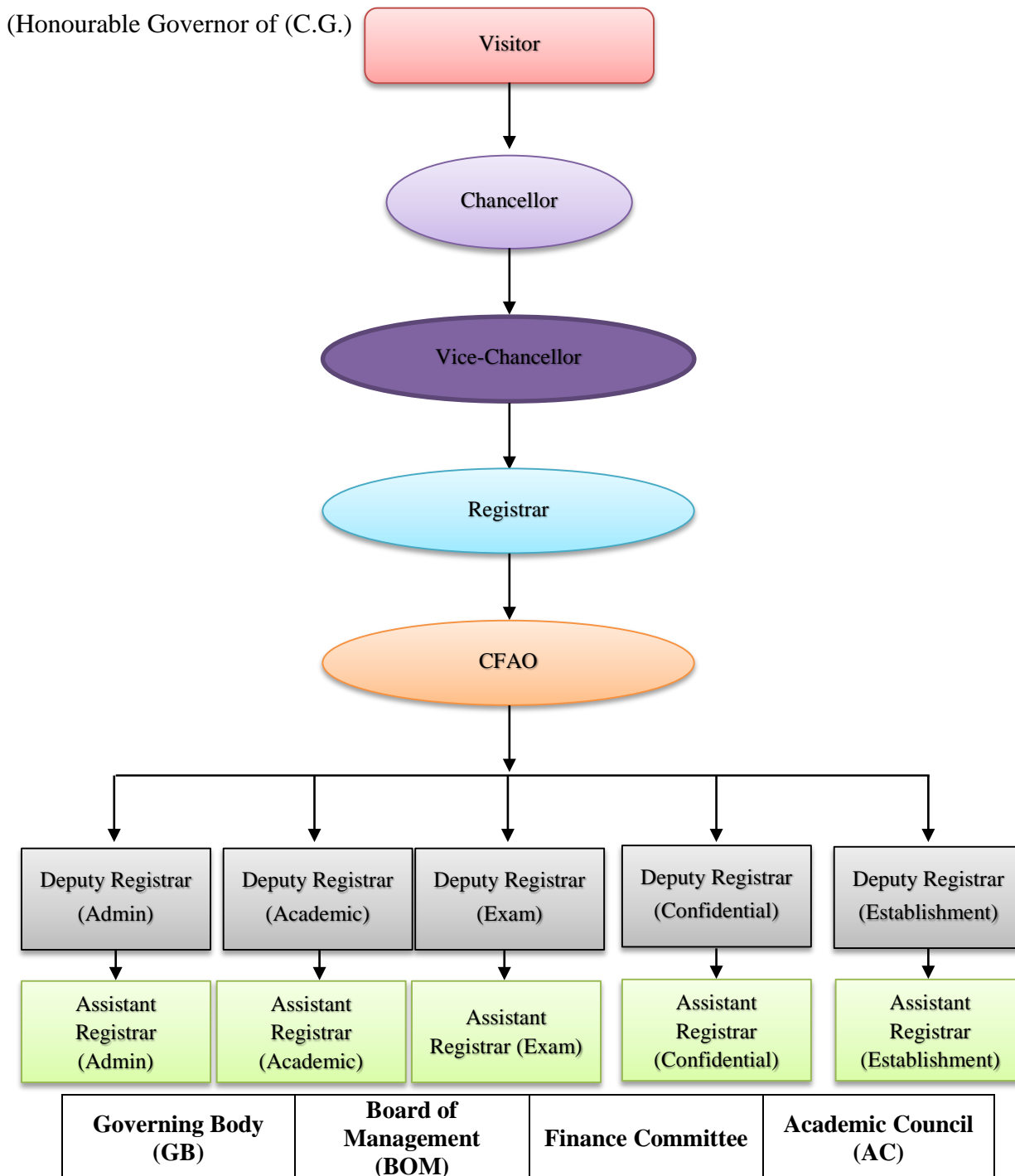

- c) **Research and development:** Research is a major engagement at CVRU. It is ensured in the curriculum design and development in the following ways:
 - The research skills of students are enhanced through introduction of courses, activities, and contents that include literature survey, data collection, data analysis etc.
 - Team work is promoted through group projects.
 - Field trips / educational tours are arranged to research laboratories of national importance and other research centres.
 - Research orientation is enhanced by visit of students at premier research institutes.
- d) **Community engagement:** Many informal groups and associations within the teaching faculty are functional to monitor the trends and

issues regarding development in open source community and integrate its benefits in the university educational processes.

- e) **Human resource planning and development:** The University promotes creative thought in areas which have deep human resource significance and to provide suitable environment for academic research and also to undertake, organize, guide and promote advanced research in Humanities, Science, Technology and Development. Several audits are conducted to take proper care of planning & development in this regard.
- f) **Industry interaction:** In professional courses, there is a strong industry-academia interface. Student at undergraduate and postgraduate levels undertake courses during semester that include an industry placement project. Students carryout projects as internship in reputed organization. During the period under assessment maximum students underwent summer training.
 - The university interacts on regular basis with industries by:-
 - Finding way to help the student to adjust to a new environment.
 - Preparing for a challenging and invoking career through industrial learning and visits.
 - Bringing some of the best companies for internship due to reputation for supplying some of the most grounded professionals to the industry.
 - Encouraging students to aim for the best jobs during recruitment.
 - Tie up for organization academic events.
 - Organizing special lectures by experts from the industry and corporate leaders.
 - Interaction during placement, summer training, and internship programmes.

6.2.3 Does the University have a formed policy to ensure quality? How is designed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

At all the levels, we believe that education does not end within the confines of the classroom. Imparting education is a proactive process with

an aim to prepare students to be active and responsible citizens who emerge to be leaders in today's multicultural globalized society.

Entire activities of university can be grouped into 3 categories:

- **Admissions** – The Courses of CVRU are led by a team of senior staff members and supported by impressive workshops that combine both traditional and latest technologies. If candidates are interested in one of our courses, we hope they will visit us and start the application process to confirm that CVRU is the place for them.
- **Examinations**-Examinations are conducted on time and the results are declared within the stipulated time period. The performance of the students is reviewed under the chairmanship of the VC.
- **Employment**–Vacant posts are duly advertised through national dailies, newspapers, employment news, website, and notice boards.

All the positions are filled through expert committees constituted by the competent authorities of the university.

6.2.4 Does the University encourages its academic departments to function independently and autonomously and how does it ensure accountability?

The procedure followed in the University is thoroughly democratic and follows a bottom-up strategy of planning, executing, and implementing. CVRU provides independence and autonomy to all stake holders, while at the same time the accountability is ensured by various means as a part of administrative system.

During the last four years the university is totally free from any type of cases in the court.

they present their case before discipline committee, the recommendations of which are pursued and approved by the VC.

The grievance committee is also available as a part of the redressal system for the employees of the university.

For women related issues gender sensitization committee is in place. Any other issue can be addressed to the VC who may dispose of the matter or may place the matter before board of management.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

For teaching staff, University regularly organizes teacher orientation programmes for developing professional efficiency.

- In addition, it is organizing in house training programmes which is more benefited for the teachers.
- Many conferences and seminars have been organized covering all new aspects and trends with respect to all fields.

- Teachers are encouraged to participate in national and international conferences which lead to exchange of knowledge and development of new ideas and concepts.
- Similarly the non – teaching staffs are also benefited by providing in house training in order to have their personal growth so that they can pursue their higher education in the university. They are given training as a short term training programme delivered by various administrative, financial, and professional organization.
- Non-teaching staff members are supported to fully grow within their professions in order to achieve some of the top administrative position in the university.

Based on various appraisals certain courses are modified while new courses are introduced. Innovative methods of teaching are devised. Mid-session tests are taken by every department and evaluation is done by faculties of concerned department. Later on, these results are displayed to the students and feedback from students are taken. Weak performers are listed up and called for special counselling sessions where mistakes committed by students are discussed and guidance & suggestions are given to improve their performances.

Based on the recommendations of experts on published work of the teachers promotions are either granted or denied. API score determine eligibility and carry weight in recruitment proportions.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism available to monitor the effective and efficient use of financial resources?

The effective and efficient use of available financial resources of the University is ensured through a proper system adopted by the University. The Finance Committee and the Governing Body are key for taking financial decisions in the university. As per the need of each Department of the University, the funds are allocated in the yearly budget for any requirement/up gradation. Income/expenditure is closely monitored by the accounts office. Proper demand in writing is made from the concerned Department with full details of the requirement of the apparatus, equipment's, maintenance and infrastructure etc.. Proper Procedure for purchase is adopted as per purchase committee and Stock Registers are maintained.

A statement of accounts detailing income/expenditure, including budgetary, is placed before the Finance Committee, which has nominees from the Chancellor or his nominee, Vice Chancellor, Registrar, two Governing Body nominees or one sponsoring body nominee for its consideration and approval after which it is placed before the Governing Body for approval.

6.4.2 Does the University have a mechanism for internal and external audit? Give details.

The University has a mechanism for adequate internal checks through continuous auditing of its financial transactions. There is a regular scrutiny of account records pertaining of the revenue and other receipt and of all expenditure.

The annual accounts of the University is audited at least once every year, by the Chartered Accountant as per clause 38, Chhattisgarh Private Universities (Establishment and Operation) act, 2005.

6.4.3 Are the institution's accounts audited regularly? Have there been any major audit objection, if so, how were they addressed?

The annual accounts including balance sheet of the University are prepared under the direction of BOM and audited by auditors appointed by the University. A copy of the annual accounts together with the audit report is submitted to the Governing Body. After approval from Governing Body, a report is submitted to the Visitor and Regulatory commission. In the last ten years of its existence, there has been no audit objections from any of the Regulatory Bodies or from the CA.

CRITERIA VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the University conduct a Green Audit of its campus?

Yes, the university prepares for the Green Audit of its campus. The following are details of the steps taken: -

- The university is already having a lush green campus with its arena of wisdom and ambience and also makes effort towards making it a green campus entirely as a significant part in the whole city of Kargi Road, Kota, Bilaspur.
- Plantation of trees and herbs is a compulsory phenomenon very frequently arranged by the university in its campus. Also the plantation programme is promoted in special occasions of **“Vanmahotsav”** and during the **“World Environment Day”**. The University administration, employees, students and all faculty members do participate in the plantation programme compulsorily.
- Incandescent lamps has been replaced with CFL & LED lamps in many departments.
- The university campus has a green herbal garden with near about 425 medicinal plants of essential medicinal use and for research purpose as well as also includes of about 20 different other types of herbs and shrubs which significantly contribute to the **“Go Green Campus”** strategic plan of the University.
- Solar panel/solar cells are incorporated to save the power and energy.

The University has a Green Raman Club which is dedicated towards spreading environment consciousness among students. It has a membership of about 50 with a Faculty member in charge. The club meets once in a month to plan out its activities which include conducting classes on nature and wildlife, organizing fun activities like collecting variety of eco-friendly material within a time period, etc. Posters spreading awareness and calling for membership are put up in every classroom. Moreover the members of the Green Raman Club are encouraged to attend symposiums on several topics. In order to save energy by switching on the designed light / fan, the Green Raman Club (GRC) paste labels indicating the light/fan numbers in all the class rooms.

The Green Raman Club took up the important task of

- Counting the number of trees in the campus and also identifying heritage trees.
- They also undertook the task of planting 100 saplings in the campus during this year.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the University to make the campus eco-friendly?

The university is taking certain steps and various initiatives to make the campus eco-friendly. The ecosystems of the university are continuously planned and monitored effectively.

➤ Energy conservation:

- Introducing and incorporating solar panel system with a number of solar cells for a smooth saving of energy and power.
- Encouraging the use of CFL & LED lamps
- Power factor control
- Restricting the random use of air conditioners
- To create awareness among the students and staff about the sustainable use of electricity, initiative has been taken by the university under the green campus strategy.
- Provision of master switch to all the classrooms, to enable to switch off all fans/ lights, at the end of classwork.
- Constructions of buildings with more provision of natural light and ventilation enabling lesser consumption of electrical energy in the daytime.

➤ Use of renewable energy:

- The university has installed solar power generation system of (10KW) for the renewable use of energy in the departments.
- Also the university is taking initiatives further to use renewable energy for providing substantial benefits towards climate, health and economy.
- Initiatives towards energy conservation include the setting up of a 5KW capacity Solar Photovoltaic cell

facility that is used in the campus.

- In addition a Biogas plant of 100 cubic cm capacity that handles 300- 400 Kg of waste has been installed and the biogas produced has been used in the labs of the departments.

➤ **Water harvesting:**

- Facilities for ground water reverse osmosis with capacity of 500 litres per hour is also available.
- 50% of rainfall is harvested and stored in a 15 lakh litre capacity tank for use in hydraulics and other laboratories
- It is done, through mini soak-pits in various places of CVRU campus.

➤ **Check dam construction:** NO

➤ **Efforts for carbon neutrality:** No.

➤ **Plantation:**

The university being situated in a lush green landscaped ambience with arena of wisdom, a huge number of trees and herbs are planted. As already mentioned before, various trees, herbs, shrubs & medicinal plants are planted in the university campus during the plantation programme very frequently.

➤ **Hazardous waste management:** The recent construction activities are using Fly-ash Bricks made from industrial waste with good acoustic and thermal properties instead of using traditional bricks.

➤ **E-waste management:**

- As far as e-waste is concerned initiatives have been taken to contact the Pollution Control Board who would suggest suitable agencies for waste disposal.
- e-wastes is dispersed through buy-back schemes

➤ **Any other:** The landscaping of the campus uses the concept of zeriscaping where native plants and plants which consume less water are used avoiding exotic, high maintenance and costly plants.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the University.

- 1. Establishment of university community Radio in-campus entitled as “Radio Raman-90.4”:** For the benefit of stakeholders of the University such as students, faculty members and other employees as well as for the nearby community (towns, villages & cities) surrounding the CVRU campus, the university has taken an innovative approach and significant initiative of establishing its own community Radio in the campus. This community Radio so established provides essential information and helps to spread awareness regarding education, sports, health aspects, social aspects, external affairs, music, culture and other innovative affairs and knowledge based economy.
- 2. Establishment of dedicated research wing and an effective research cell:** This cell of the University encourages quality research and interdisciplinary research of innovative approach towards various fields for post graduate students and the research scholars especially of M.Phil. & Ph.D. The university is also planning to set up a “Research Park” for the industry academia interface.
- 3. - 4. Introducing combination involvement of at least one value added course and one enrichment course essential along with regular course through the certified programmes of skill development for the students:** To enhance the skilled manpower in the university and also to encourage and develop literary, managerial and technological skills among the students to groom their personality and behavioural aspects, the university has taken this step as an innovative approach.
- 5. Establishment of smart classrooms, laboratories & library with advanced and modern infrastructure:** CVRU has established its modern well equipped labs and library with a mission of providing quality education of world class level & scientific development of its arena of wisdom through an advanced environment of knowledge. The university library provides access to huge number of online e-journals and helps through INFLIBNET, DELNET using Koha and OPAC (SOUL) software.

- Regarding the energy and water sustainability the faculties of the Science and Engineering used to go to the villages to conduct various activities among the villagers in the form of camps and personal interaction & explaining them various government scheme regarding Solar energy generation for household and irrigation related areas etc.
- Department of education looks after the education need of the Villages and conducts various awareness activities in form of rally and workshops.

- “Save girl child” and “Swach Bharat Abhiyan” is taken care by all the departments of the University in planning the programme and execution of it in villages to make them aware of the current need of the Human race.
- The activities has been designed with this objective in mind and links of many academic and administrative wings of the University to serve Motherland with knowledge and Power of Youth.
- The department of Chemistry visits the village and spreads awareness and information regarding the environmental pollution and also checks the soil and the water contamination and pollution through its laboratory tools by 9 parameter water analyser kit and soil testing kit kept in the chemistry lab thereby using its mobility.

3. The Context

CVRU is a Premier University in central India surrounded with a number of villages around. The mission for the development of the Villages in context with the aspects to Sustainability, Cleanliness, and Save Girl child related areas through the help of Youth is the need of the time. - The villagers send their water and soil samples for contamination testing and parameter evaluation such as TDS etc. in the CVRU chemistry lab.

- **Establishment of a “Biotech Park Cum Herbal Garden”** in CVRU campus by the faculty of life science including the department of Botany & Biotechnology:

This “Biotech Park cum Herbal Garden” developed in the University Campus in about 10 Acres of the campus land area provides a huge opportunity for all the stakeholders of the university in the field of research as well as towards the social benefit.

The departments of Botany & Biotechnology of the university planned to practice the advance practice in through the use of technology which can help to spread awareness to the nearby farmers and also to generate social benefit from the revenue output of the park products as mentioned below:

- Fertile land cultivation (1st Step)
- Incorporating crops culture and vegetable culture such as (Corn, Paddy, lady's finger etc.)
- Developing medicinal plant garden and herbal nursery for further research benefit of the students and faculties using the plant extracts
- Development of poly house & Green House
- Preparation of Bio fertilizers
- Social benefit by providing general awareness regarding fertilizers, cultivation etc. to the farmers through the 15 day special training programmes half yearly arranged by the university for the nearby farmer.



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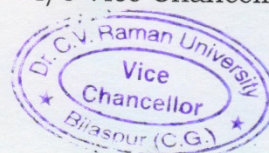
