The following general themes would be covered in this course.

Unit-2

History and other Discipline-Archaeology; Geography; Anthropology; Natural Applied Sciences and Literature

Unit-3

Traditions in Historical Writing-Greco-Roman traditions; Chinese traditions; Ancient Indian tradition of Historiography; Baan Bhatt and Kalhan Historiography.

Unit-4

Medieval Indian Historiography, problems of Historiography in medieval India. Main features of Historiography of Minhaj-us-Siraj, Siraj ud-Din, Bahrain, Abdul Qadir Bada'uni.

Emphasis is laid on promoting among the students a critical approach to the study of rise of totalitarian ideologies such as Nazism, Fascism, and Militarism and also the emergence of anti-colonial movements in Asia and the Communist revolution in China. The course will also delineate the Non-aligned movement and the disintegration of Soviet Union and the emergence of Uni-polar system in the world.
